


Book Study Opportunity

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From the Desk of Mark

Happy New Year! Or Happy New Day?

Some of my friends are already discussing, in a semi-serious manner, what New Year's resolutions they may make for 2018. Diets seem to lead the way, followed closely by exercise. One friend is going to try morning devotions for the first time.

It is likely that you and I have attempted at times to make the new year something that is goal-oriented and productive. More often than not I have failed in my early resolve and have simply watched my determined goals evaporate as the rest of daily life is re-inserted into each day. The sand castle resolutions that I built too closely to the surf are gone at the next high tide.

A few years ago, I read a short book that looked at the component often missing when we set goals that predictably fail. According to author Johnny Truant, the step we most often neglected is actually stepping out of the planning and goal setting stage and into moving into an action plan. Truant maintains that action is often not part of the goal setting most of us do. Action leads us from what we hope to do into the realm of detailing how we will accomplish that goal. In action, each challenge in shifting our time commitments to include our goal is carefully added to the overall equation.

But what do the scriptures say about time? Is there any wisdom indicating how we are to live in the time we have?

When we were growing up, our mother would wake us each school morning with the verse, "This is the day the Lord has made; we will rejoice and be glad in it." - Psalm 118:24. I really did not like that mode of alarm clock, and grumbled at the intrusion which daily squashed my contented dreams. But that verse still permeates my soul and now I remember it often with great fondness and appreciation.

All this is to say that perhaps the best New Year's resolution we can make is to adapt what the Bible suggests we do daily into as many days in 2018 as we can. Why take on the year when we can follow God's guidance for each new day? In the end, these daily moments of awareness will transform our lives and hearts. So, as a gift of love, I ask you to consider these verses in the new year.

Psalm 1:2. But their delight is in the law of the Lord, and on God's law they meditate day and night.

Psalm 23:6. Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life, and I shall dwell in the house of the Lord my whole life long.

Psalm 27:5. For God will hide me in God's shelter in the day of trouble; God will conceal me under the cover of his tent; God will set me high on a rock.

Psalm 50:15. Call on me in the day of trouble; I will deliver you, and you shall glorify me.

Psalm 68:19. Blessed be the Lord, who daily bears us up; God is our salvation.

Lamentations 3:22-24. GOD's loyal love couldn't have run out, God's merciful love couldn't have dried up. They're created new every morning. How great your faithfulness! I'm sticking with God. (I say it over and over).

Thank you for your part in our Federated Church family. And may God bless you in each new day in 2018.

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Church Council News

Church Council was delighted to welcome Jackie Hallack as the Clerk at our December meeting. Volunteerism is at the heart of the important work of Federated. We are grateful for all who step forward to serve.

Paul Koepf attended the meeting representing the Properties Committee which, along with assistance from other volunteers in the congregation, is guiding capital projects funded by the Rejoice & Renew Capital Campaign. They are progressing on receiving bids and setting timelines for building improvements. We have also ordered the new console for our organ, and a team is working on a redesign of the organ space. Please note the article on page 5 specific to the capital projects.

Council used welcome feedback and narrative within the congregation in planning how to update the symbols of our Open and Affirming (ONA) welcome. After lengthy discussion, Church Council unanimously approved the following change: to "replace the permanency of the rainbow flag with a flag of the Christian Church, erect a banner on the Bell Street building displaying our ONA commitment, place ONA symbols on each of the primary entry doors at Bell Street and the Family Life Center, and allow additional flags to be flown in accordance with our flag policy." We hope this expands the message of promoting civil rights and proclaims we are a congregation who warmly welcomes everyone in our community whether represented in the majority or of a marginalized group.

We have passed the \$1 million mark in stewardship pledges for 2018. We celebrate the dedicated giving of our congregation thus far and ask the 100 or so families who pledged in 2017, but have not yet committed for 2018, to please submit their pledges. The budget to be approved by the congregation at the Annual Meeting on February 11 is limited by the amount pledged. If we fall short of the amount pledged in 2017, we will need to adjust salary and program spending downward to match. Federated is so alive with mission and programming. Please provide your faithful support so we can continue to fulfill our promise.

At the Church Council retreat on November 10-11, we addressed WHY Federated exists and thrives, instead of focusing on the HOW. Three overriding themes emerged defining our desire to *seek*, *serve*, and *connect*. Together we are on a faith journey in which we continually *seek* God's will for us. The Federated community *serves* in partnership and compassion through mission and outreach. Thirdly, our church family actively makes *connections* and strengthens bonds. The leadership of Federated will apply these three defining themes to guide our decisions and goals for 2018.

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Federated News & Updates

January 2018 *Rejoice & Renew* Capital Campaign Projects Update

Plans are underway for the refurbishment of The Federated Church's sanctuary organ. Marcia Snavely has been instrumental in orchestrating this entire project. A contract has already been signed and a replacement console ordered for the pipe organ. We are thankful for Marcia's expertise and in debt for her guidance!

As the Properties Committee coordinates the rest of the monumental projects of the capital campaign, we want staff and members to know we pray upon our decisions and work to give you all the best value. Your prayers and confidence bolster us forward!

The Properties Committee is already blessed with members Keith Mast (engineer) and Bill Lentz (commercial construction superintendent and project manager), so we are well supported through this significant evolution of our church facilities and renewal.

We have asked several members of the church to contribute to the evaluation of our architectural systems and to suggest ways to facilitate an optimal bidding process. Thanks go out to Bill Mason (architect), John Giles (general contractor) and Bob Doxey (organization

development). As we move through this two-year project, we will be looking for congregational expertise.

It became clear from the beginning that our three largest projects (roof, HVAC, and insulation) were linked and had to be engineered together. We have three different roof structures and three different roofing materials across the structure. Additionally, this poses three different insulation challenges for our antique buildings, as well as for our modern structures. But, it turns out, the greater conundrum is our heating and cooling. Seven different pieces of machinery from a multitude of time periods in the past few decades must be updated.

Therefore, we have hired an engineering company to do an energy audit, inspect, and evaluate our equipment. We have received multiple reports over the past few months as we move through the analysis of expensive and complicated systems. The working drawing and final specification will be complete very soon.

We all owe a big thank you to Bill Mason for thorough pre-analysis of our roofing systems and donating working drawings and specifications. An important goal within this triad of projects is closing the energy envelope.



Our Committee will determine insulation specifications and materials required based on the engineers' recommendations. Bid documents will be ready by early winter. Bill Lentz has provided an extensive list of qualified commercial contractors. Suggestions from the congregation should be submitted to the Properties Committee box in the office or email Paul Koepf, chair. We will identify qualified bidders and request bids on a selected basis.

It is our hope to start construction in alignment with the church calendar. But be fore-warned: With the construction at the neighboring school and months of work here at Bell Street, it may be prudent to discuss moving the summer church to our wonderful facility on Route 306. 


Special Thanks

Faith Formation and Spirituality

Epiphany Preaching Series: "How the Church reveals Christ" January 7 through February 11

The season after Christmastide in the church is Epiphany. It begins with celebrating the visit of the Magi to Jesus, on January 6, after the 12 days of Christmas. "Epiphany" means revelation, or realization, and celebrates the revelation of the Christ to those who traveled so far to find him.

The first Sunday of Epiphany this year is January 7, and it celebrates the baptism of Christ. This year, our lectionary gospel readings are taken mostly from Mark. We will reflect on his telling of the story of Jesus' baptism. In this sacrament, Jesus is revealed as God's beloved, and we are reminded that we also are beloved children of God. Baptism is the rite of initiation into the church, into the Christian community.

In the following weeks, we will explore how it is that church, that we as a community of Christians, reveal Christ to the world. Come hear our sermon series focusing on the four pillars of the church, pillars that have framed our understanding of church: Faith Formation, Community, Worship and Service.

Quoting from Hamilton's Rally Day sermon, we are reminded that: "These pillars are the heart of our identity as the family of God, and they're the North Star for how we determine who we are and what it is we're to be about. Worship, faith formation, the building of community, and reaching out to the world beyond us—that's the heart of Federated. As we engage, as family, in those central tasks, we're being true to the church of Jesus Christ. And it's then that the presence of God comes most richly to life." Indeed, this is how the presence of God, how Christ is revealed in our world.

We will explore how each of these unveils truths about Jesus, brings us into deeper understanding. Faith formation asks that we make a commitment to grow deeper in our knowledge of God, of God's word, of God's desire for us and for our world.
