A combined choir and soloists will provide haunting and prayerful music that end the service with the strains of "Were You There..." as we leave in silence and reverence.

**Good Friday Stations of the Cross Walk–March 30 at 12:00—2:00 pm** (sponsored by Chagrin Valley Council of Churches) Participants from Christian churches of the Chagrin Valley will journey two miles to commemorate the footsteps of Jesus Christ on his journey along the way of the Cross. Beginning and ending at the Gazebo in downtown Chagrin Falls, there will be 14 stops on which to pray and to reflect during the route. All ages are encouraged to participate. Wear red if you have it. 
### Easter Sunrise Service & Breakfast—April 1 at 6:30 am at the Family Life Center

# From the Desk of Hamilton

Dear Friends,

Welcome to the season of Lent! Derived from the word "lengthen," Lent is a rich 40-day season of personal and communal reflection, and of preparation for the wonders of Easter. Strikingly, the season began this year on Valentine's Day—the first time that's happened since 1945. And it ends with Easter on, of all days, April Fool's Day. There's rich symbolism in all of it!

One of the highlights of the Lenten season for me will be an opportunity to share some time together with a local Muslim community of faith. The Chagrin Valley Islamic Center has recently organized itself, and is in the process of preparing to build a mosque on Liberty Road in Solon. Together, they and we have planned a dinner for both communities on Sunday evening, March 11, in Fellowship Hall, from 5:00-7:30 pm.

I have realized for years that I know little about Islam and what it's like to be Muslim. So I have been alert to the possibility of establishing a relationship with a local community of Muslims. As it happens, I officiated at a wedding this past summer, in which one of the bridesmaids was Muslim. And happily, Mary and I were seated at a table right next to family members of this bridesmaid. I was delighted, that evening, to have time to talk with several members of the family. We had rich and substantive and joy-filled conversation with each other. When I approached them soon after about sharing an event together, they were extremely receptive to the idea. After several more conversations, members of that community have enthusiastically joined with a plan to share dinner together on that Sunday evening.

We will be hosting the event in Bell Street's Fellowship Hall that evening. Our Muslim friends will be bringing much of the meal. Muslims need their food to be halal. The word "halal" means essentially that it is prepared in the name of God. Not unlike kosher food that Jews eat, it has been blessed, and God has been thanked for it.

We would like any Federated members and friends to attend. The only requirement is that you make a reservation. Because our Muslim friends will be doing the lion's share of the food preparation, we want to have an accurate sense of how many people will be there. So do **call in to the church (440.247.6490) by Thursday, March 8**. Also, because of Fellowship Hall's size, we will have to limit reservations to **the first 50 who RSVP**.

That evening we will share a meal together. A member of the Islamic Center and I will both talk about the event and our hopes and dreams. We will also provide opportunity for table conversation. Children are welcome, and we very much hope they will come.

In a world in which suspicion and mistrust run rampant, this is a wonderful, God-given opportunity to connect with Muslim sisters and brothers. I hope you can make it.

# **Church Council News**

The Council activity for February was focused on preparations for the Annual Meeting and finalizing the church budget for 2018. Hopefully you were able to attend and joined in this celebration of our vibrant congregation and church. If not, I encourage you to obtain a copy of the 2017 Annual Report from the church office and read about all of the wonderful activities within Federated last year. You can also obtain a copy of our 2018 budget and church finances.

Total giving to the church in 2017, exceeded contributions in 2016, even though prior pledges had been down year over year. This strong giving combined with careful stewardship of our expenses resulted in a surplus of 8.9% or \$102,861. This surplus was applied in the 2018 budget to largely non-recurring expenses, since a repeat of this surplus cannot be expected. Of significance, is our ability to reduce the \$150,517 outstanding loan by \$62,861, in addition to regular 2018 budgeted principal payments of \$27,600. The strong giving by congregants, combined with the very successful Rejoice & Renew Capital Campaign, places Federated on stable financial ground entering 2018.

Federated continues to be a vibrant, active community of faith. Participation in the many ministries and hosted meetings each week is burgeoning at Federated, beyond Sunday mornings. This past year, we have explored our understanding of social justice through inspirational sermons and music, service projects by the Children and Family Ministries, formation of the Social Justice Advocacy Ministry (SJAM), Mission & Service giving and events, and St. Paul's Church Ministry. We live our faith in worship and in deeds.

As we continue our faith journey in 2018, we hope to amplify our declaration of faith through expanded use of our facilities with development of a church-sponsored preschool for 2019, a Summer Sunday School experience with emphasis on outdoor activities and nature, and multi-generation gardens, all to be hosted at the Family Life Center. While the traditional worship services continue to be the heart of our Sunday experience, we also will seek emphasis by clergy, Council, commissions, committees and congregants to innovate our Sunday morning venue to expand our spiritually enriching programs for our congregants and guests. Further, we introduce a 2018 theme, "Behold, how they love one another" where our words and actions to one another, to our community, to the world proclaim the love and tenacity of Jesus Christ.

I want to close this final article for me as Moderator, by thanking all of the staff, leaders and congregants who have supported me and, more importantly, supported the vision, mission and service of the Federated Church. Your enthusiasm and hard work are what make Federated a tremendous witness to Jesus Christ and the power of our faith in our neighborhoods and beyond.

## **Capital Campaign Projects Update**

As you will notice in the 2017 Properties Committee Annual Report (see p.6) submitted by Bob Doxey, John Giles, Paul Koepf, Bill Lentz, Bill Mason and Keith Mast, capital (!) things are starting to happen around here! In the first full week of February, they hosted 13 general contractors, HVAC, and roofing contractors at a pre-bid meeting and site visit. Our parking lot was full of pickup trucks! The meeting was an opportunity to clarify any questions bidders may have with the solicitation documents, scope of work and other details, as well as a chance to tour the ins and outs of our Bell Street facility. The committee was very pleased that 13 of the 14 invited general/subcontractors attended the meeting, although a second meeting may be scheduled, if the committee deems it necessary.

In addition, you may have seen a new cornerstone displayed on the reception desk. As noted in the Capital Campaign Projects Start Date List (see p.6), the parking lot canopy entrance will be renovated this summer. This will include

the new cornerstone and brick surround. Another item mentioned on the list is technology integration. In February, the church staff (thanks, Melinda!) worked on organizing the current location of phones and our future needs in both facilities. And finally, the Properties Committee met with an expert in the audio visual field to discuss ideas about our other technology integration needs. With this added information, they will be able to make informed decisions about any changes to be implemented.

During the Annual Meeting, Paul, Keith and Bill shared more exciting information: the Properties Committee expects that the dumpsters, as well as a construction trailer, should arrive in our parking lot around mid-May in preparation for tearing off the old roof. Dust will be flying! For this reason, they are recommending that summertime Sunday services be held at the Family Life Center.

And finally, Paul Koepf also mentioned during the Annual Meeting that the

committee will be looking for volunteers for small projects that can be completed in, let's say, a single morning or afternoon. Please be sure to contact Paul, or any member of the committee, if you have some time and talent that you could devote to our renovations. All of the members of the committee are doing such a wonderful job being good stewards of the money raised to renovate and upgrade our much-loved facilities. We are so thankful to be in such good hands!



# March 2018 Rejoice & Renew Capital Campaign Update

If you couldn't attend Federated's Annual Meeting on February 11, you must have missed Robin Harbage's happy dance! What exciting news he shared! It was confirmed that, since Federated has raised more than \$2.9 million in pledges,



Church Council passed a motion at the January meeting to fund all campaign items included in both the \$2.2 million "Minimum" and \$3.0 million "Challenge" goals with the exception of \$100,000 of funding for deferred major maintenance.



On the next page of this edition of the SPIRE you will see a listing of those projects submitted by our Properties Committee, along with proposed start dates. This is a wonderful starting point and, just like any renovation project, we're sure that items will be moved around as funds arrive or when it becomes obvious that projects are linked and need to be coordinated with one another. A lot of work has gone into this Project List and we are grateful to Paul Koepf, Bill Lentz, Keith Mast, Bob Doxey, and Bill Mason!

## **Properties Committee 2017 Report**

(Omitted from 2017 Annual Report)

The Properties Committee consists of three elected members and a non-voting member from the congregation. Its charter is to support the Senior Director of Operations in matters concerning the operation and maintenance physical plant of the church and to serve in an advisory capacity for the Church Council for matters involving church property.

During 2017 the committee was actively engaged with issues at both Bell Street and the Family Life Center (FLC) including the water system at FLC, parking alternatives during the Intermediate School remodeling, review of Federated's insurance coverage, Sanctuary pew arrangement to provide more active participation for worshippers with mobility issues, support for the Senior Director of Operations at the Bainbridge Zoning Commission for use of the FLC for a YMCA camp, conferred with Intermediate School construction personnel regarding sanitary and storm sewer connections from the school on church property, and worked with Mission and Service Commission for an allocation plan for funds generated by Trinkets N Treasures.


In June, the committee voted to establish a second monthly meeting to better meet the increased work load created by those Capital Campaign projects assigned to the committee. In addition, it added two ad hoc members, John Giles and Bill Mason to the committee. Both bring professional expertise to help manage the two major projects assigned to the committee; replacement of the Heating, Ventilating and Air Conditioning (HVAC) system and replacement of the roof at Bell Street. The committee has worked with a consulting engineering design firm to analyze existing systems, identify appropriate procedure for renewal of these systems and create bidding specifications and technical drawings. The committee has created the bid specifications and drawings for the roof project utilizing committee and ad hoc personnel. Bidding packages are scheduled to be sent out in February. The committee began meeting weekly in January, 2018 to provide better communication and operating support for all upcoming capital projects scheduled for the year.

**Racial Justice** — The Racial Justice subcommittee of SJAM will be offering two learning opportunities! As we work to advocate for social justice, we also realize that we have a lot to learn.

#### White Privilege: Let's Talk - A Resource for Transformational Dialogue

An adult curriculum from the United Church of Christ designed to invite church members to engage in safe, meaningful, substantive, and bold conversations on race. Last spring, we offered the UCC's *White Privilege* curriculum. Six groups participated in the six-session course. We will offer two to three more rounds of *White Privilege* this spring, beginning the week of April 1. ### Noah's Ark Encounter With Overnight in Covington, KY Saturday & Sunday, May 19-20

### <u>A word about the Ark trip:</u>

I have heard that some people are unsure about the trip due to the religious views of the builder of the Ark, Ken Ham. Although I have no desire to accept any of his teachings, I think the Ark is a spectacular structure, and is well worth the trip. Barry and I went there last year and loved it. There was very little evidence of Ken's religious fanaticism.

The story of the Ark is a part of all Judeo-Christian history and is represented well. It is very interesting to see how it houses all the animals and allows for their feeding and care. You can see how Noah and his family lived and grew food during the time on board. We hope to see you on the trip! - Kathie Biggin, Primetime Committee trips coordinator

While we do not see any extended rain in the forecast, at least for 40 days and 40 nights, we do know of a fellow named "Noah" who was spared from a flood by loading his family and many of the world's animals into an Ark that he built from instructions he had been given. Although no one has ever discovered the "original Ark," we will be seeing a new version, which was built in a similar fashion.

It was built as described in the Book of Genesis using the original dimensions. The ark is 510 feet long, 50 feet tall and 85 feet wide. Unbelievably, it can house up to 10,000 people and is the largest wooden timber structure in the world. See how Noah and his family may have lived, as well as an "animatronic Noah" who will answer questions.

I am delighted to announce that Marty Culbertson is the co-leader for Federated Day Missions (FDM) and she and I are working to assemble a full year of projects for our church family.

Day mission events are for the whole Federated Church family. Any age, any family configuration – all of us working to fulfill Jesus' command that we "love one another."



## **Parish Nurse Corner**

This winter has been hard on the folks in the Ohio City neighborhood surrounding our sister church, St. Paul's UCC. About 1/3 are homeless and come to St. Paul's to warm up, to eat, to converse with their friends in this unique community, and to visit the nursing clinic for much needed supplies and emotional support. The most common material requests are for underwear, socks (often single use due to lack of laundry facilities or a place to dry their clothes), mittens, hats, baby products, and assorted male and female hygiene supplies. If they are lucky, they have a backpack to hold their stuff which often comprises all the belongings they own.

Other clients are those with minimal housing and no transportation who struggle to pay their rent, utility, and food bills on their limited disability and/or SS payment. These folks know they will always be welcome in the PN clinic to replenish their supplies, get their BP checked, and ask questions about their health. In addition, St. Paul's houses a food pantry, a used clothing outlet, a community telephone, a lunch program, and the Turning Point recovery program . Our Thursday RN gives flu shots, checks blood sugars, and continues to distribute requested supplies. We refer our clients with treatable health issues to Care Alliance, the neighborhood free medical clinic.

The PN clinic is mostly supported by generous donations of either money or supplies as listed on the box in the Bell Street Lobby. Our lunch program is supported by Federated Women's Fellowship, and St. Paul's sends a check every month to partially finance the necessary shopping that I do (Drug Mart for underwear and socks and Dollar Tree for toiletries). To all of our supporters, a big "thank you" for past and future support and an invitation to visit our PN volunteer mission any Tuesday, Wednesday, or Thursday morning.

Please keep us in mind as we all cope with this difficult winter. We would love to have a few substitute volunteers, who have a background in health, for when I can't be there or a person to cover Friday morning. (If you wish to donate money, be sure to designate "Parish Nurse" on the memo line of your check.)
