All of the patching work in the Sanctuary has been completed, the new Chancel area has been stained, the roof is finished, and the insulation and HVAC systems have been installed. Currently, they are balancing the temperature of the heat systems. We are so thankful for all the attention to detail that has been a part of this process.

# From Hamilton's Desk

#### Dear Friends,

Superb work continues in our Bell Street facility, and it's a real joy to watch it all unfold. We are blessed beyond measure by the commitment of you, our donors, as well as by the dedication and talent of the craftspeople performing the work. When we return to our Sanctuary on November 18, we are in for a treat. Come that day to a single service at 10:00 am and celebrate the completion of a major portion of our Rejoice and Renew Capital Campaign. It will be a blast!

At the same time, I am acutely aware of other fantastic blessings in the life of this church, and I want to continue to lift those up and celebrate them. Some of those blessings are related to our history and identity. As members of this congregation in the United Church of Christ, I want to make sure we are reminded regularly of the dedication and devotion of our forebears that has made of the UCC a leader in matters of faith and social justice. Here are some of our denomination's highlights:

- In 1785, Lemuel Haynes was ordained in a predecessor body of the UCC, the first African American ordained by a Protestant denomination.
- In 1810, America's first foreign mission society, the American Board of Commissioners of Foreign Missions (ABCFM) was formed by Congregationalists in Massachusetts. In fact, the birth of this society happened at my alma mater. Five Williams College students who were caught in a rainstorm hid under a haystack and made a pact with each other to lead this mission effort. And now, in a field at Williams, the Haystack Monument commemorates the beginnings of that remarkable movement.
- In 1853, the first woman since New Testament times was ordained as a pastor. And while it took another 120 years or so before the movement caught on, the ordination of Antoinette Brown was a luminous event in church history.
- In the 1890s, Washington Gladden, who served First Congregational Church in Columbus OH, proclaimed the Social Gospel, which takes literally the commandment of Jesus to "love your neighbor as yourself." Social Gospel preachers denounced injustice and exploitation of those who are poor.
- In 1972, the UCC's Golden Gate Association ordained the first openly gay person as a minister in a mainline Protestant denomination, the Rev. William R. Johnson.

We have so much for which to be grateful. As we prepare to reenter our Sanctuary, and soon to begin a new and exciting worship service, may we rededicate ourselves to the reason we are here: to praise God, and to do the work to which God calls us. In the words of a hymn, that task is: "to find the lost and lonely one, to heal the broken soul with love, to feed the hungry

children with warmth and good food, to feel the earth below, the sky above! ... To bring hope to every task you do, to dance at a baby's new birth, to make music in an old person's heart, and sing to the colors of the earth!" ("I Am the Light of the World!" vv. 2, 4).

May God continue to bless us with enormous grace and favor. And may we respond in love with all our hearts, that all over the Chagrin Valley, people may say, "Behold how they love one another!"

#### **RISE to Shine!** Our New Worship Schedule

Sunday mornings at Federated, get ready to **RISE**! Council's Task Force for **Re-Imagining the Sunday Experience** gathered your reactions to five prototypes for re-imagining a worship experience that opens our doors and horizons to new light. Beginning in December and throughout this program year the congregation will float possibilities in action.

At February's Annual Meeting, a goal to "Re-Imagine the Sunday Experience" set up a team and spun the wheels in motion. The charge was to imagine the kind of worship experience that responds to the needs of a younger generation and that cultivates a rich sense of the presence of God in fresh and relevant ways. Using tools for design thinking, members of the task force hosted input sessions across the summer, designed bare-bones prototypes to spur active feedback from our staff and congregants, and then analyzed the information gathered along the way to discover trends, needs and passions.

We stand ready to breathe life into the favored and viable features to test-run a model, play with ideas and possibilities, and continue to innovate, tweak and refine across the year.

Throughout November, even as we re -enter our 76 Bell Sanctuary, we will continue a united worship at 10 am. Then, starting the first Sunday in Advent (December 2) we will dedicate two distinct worship times and styles. Our traditional worship will run 10-11 am, with the richness and invitational welcome of our Federated Choirs and Sunday School. Then from 11:30 am-12:15 pm, we offer "Rise to Shine" to shine God's light in spirited, eclectic and relevant worship, featuring excellent music and participation alongside an enriching sermon.

We encourage the congregation's participation, input and promotion of "Rise to Shine" to friends and family to help Federated move toward God's promising and thriving future at Federated "for this generation and the next." Spirited. Relational. Relevant. Come: let's grow a church with soul and spirit...together!

## A Comprehensive Commitment to Federated Family Ministries

What might happen if the whole church turned its time, energy, and attention to revitalizing Family Ministries? What if "Family Ministries" became more than a position and overflowed into a whole-church commitment to cultivating the next generations of seekers and servant leaders?

At a recent planning retreat, convening Church Staff and Church Council together, we sanctioned a common priority: to amplify ways we value children, youth, and families by providing dynamic and inviting worship, faith education, and programming. To take this commitment to scale, we charged every commission and program staff member to consider information gained from the community input sessions of the summer and to design action plans for engaging children, youth, and families more deliberately and responsively.

Meanwhile, our Family Ministries Team (Rev. Mark Simone, Marty Culbertson, and Kiersti Critchfield) is in the process of renewing our approach (Continued on p. 11)

#### Movie Night: Smog of the Sea November 19 | 7:00 pm Family Life Center Hearth Room

The *Smog of the Sea* chronicles a one-week journey through the remote waters of the Sargasso Sea. Marine scientist Marcus Eriksen invited onboard an unusual crew to help him study the sea. Renowned surfers Keith & Dan Malloy, musician Jack Johnson, spear fisherwoman Kimi Werner, and bodysurfer Mark Cunningham become citizen scientists on a mission to assess the fate of plastics in the world's oceans.

As the crew sieves the water and sorts through their haul, a disturbing reality sets in: a fog of microplastics permeates the world's oceans, trillions of nearly invisible plastic shards making their way up the marine food chain. You can clean up a garbage patch, but how do you stop a fog?

The Smog of the Sea provides a new perspective on the once pristine oceans, and makes an artful call to action for rethinking the scourge of the sea — single-use plastic.

Come join us for the movie and discussion about what steps we can take to make a difference, and help curb the scourge of plastics on this planet.



### **Fall Planet Friendly Tasks**

- Clean the ducts and area behind the dryer. And don't forget, clean the filter after every use and every once in a while, give it a good wash.
- 2. Check windows for proper caulking. If you have single-pane windows, add storm windows. Even a plastic film over windows will reduce heat loss. Find kits at DIY stores.
- Check doors for weather stripping and replace as necessary. If drafts sneak in under exterior doors, replace the threshold or block drafts with a rolled-up towel or blanket.
- 4. Check your roof for any missing or damaged tiles or shingles.
- 5. Clean the roof gutters and make sure downspouts are pointed away from the house.
