About Our New Organ: Demonstration on January 6

A message from Marcia Snavely

It is a dream come true and an answer to prayers. Thanks to all of you for your support for our project which began in 2012 when we formed an Organ Committee to look into updating our organ. Our Schantz pipe organ had served us well for over 50 years but the electrical connections, the leathering of the pipes and the outdated console were in need of renovation. Our Organ Committee spent over six months learning about various options from organ companies and visiting installations. I think the Organ Committee's recommendations were the catalyst for our Capital Campaign which resulted in so many other updates and improvements.

Our new organ is a Rodgers Infinity hybrid organ. Hybrid means that we have kept and are using all of the pipes from our Schantz organ but are adding many digital sounds as well. Previously we had 27 ranks of pipes; now we have the equivalent of 398 ranks. Previously we had six general pistons to set registrations; now we have more than 1200. I could go on and on about what we had before and what we now have... the difference is amazing. It's comparable to what a 1950's automobile looks like beside today's models.

On January 6 during the service I will be talking a little about the organ. After the service (Postlude) I will be playing a demo of some of the amazing organ sounds now available.

Later in the spring we hope to have an official organ dedication concert, and perhaps in the fall, a well-known concert organist. We now have one of the largest, finest and most versatile organs in the area and want to use it to its full advantage. On that note, I am hoping that people will remain quiet for Preludes and Postludes so its full capabilities can be heard and appreciated. It is so effective in setting the mood for a rich, full worship experience.

Please be patient with me as I continue to learn the new challenges and the infinite ways of using this instrument.

Once again thanks for your generous support of this project. This is my 25th year as organist for the Federated Church and what a magnificent silver anniversary gift for me. It has been such a privilege to be part of this music program throughout the years and this is the icing on the cake. I feel truly blessed.

Church Council News

"The people walking in darkness have seen a great light; on those living in the land of deep darkness a light has dawned." - Isaiah 9:2

A new day is dawning! So much goodness and promise swells in and around the missions and ministries of Federated!

Commissions and staff reported emerging initiatives, each at various planning stages and on the horizon for 2019. The Worship and Music Commission plans to launch a new concert series; they also continue to envision the RISE to Shine worship experience as it evolves. A team from SJAM and the Mission & Service Commission is exploring paths for becoming a "Creation Justice" church. The Telling Our Story Commission proposes more integrated and theme-focused marketing and communications. The Spiritual Formation Commission, in conjunction with our Family Ministries team, is framing a new series of Public Square Family Forums with speakers to spur important faith community conversations on difficult topics. God is still speaking among us!

Church Council follows a process for reviewing the resources needed when new ideas and initiatives arise. We aim to ensure the church holds the capacity to shepherd programming with responsible planning and stewardship. Contact a member of Church Council to learn more about this process if you have an initiative you would like the church to consider.

Search For the Christ Child once again ushered in the "reason for the season" to our congregants and to the wider community as shepherds, angels, innkeepers and kings guided visitors through a maze to the lowly manger scene. This year exceeded last year, with more than 300 participants! God's light shines through!

The Mission & Service Commission selected HOLA Ohio as the recipient for our legendary Christmas Eve offering. The nonprofit HOLA provides advocacy, education, and a safe haven for the Latino community in NE Ohio. Funding an education wing to enhance a donated (and abandoned) building in downtown Painesville will help to enrich the economy and surrounding community by developing leadership and other services to a marginalized people living in fear. Please encourage friends and family to join us Christmas Eve and to give generously to make a difference!

Becky Gruss, chair of the Finance Committee, shared encouraging end-of-year financial projections. Our giving exceeded the annual budget due to three key factors: increased rental income, increased non-pledge receipts, and the interest on Capital Campaign funds. Also, the monumental Capital Campaign projects were completed within the cash donations available so far, no need for loans. It was determined to "press pause" to allow time to close out financials and plan for phase two projects. A working group with representatives from Properties Committee, Finance Committee, staff, and Church Council will analyze priorities and propose a plan for next steps. The dedication and commitment of generous givers continue to invest in a strong legacy going forward.

Stewardship reported new pledges supporting the 2019 budget exceeded pledges lost from those who passed or moved away. Two-thirds of expected pledges are in. Calls continue to go out to all those who have not yet returned a pledge card. Please bring in or call in your pledge commitment today, if you have not yet done so. The 2019 budget and potential directly mirror your generosity!

Creative Giving and Federated Tax ID

While navigating your own financial planning and tax benefits at the year-end, you may be considering making The Federated Church a part of your charitable legacy. There are a number of ways of **ensuring our long-term sustainability** while meeting your financial needs:

- Name The Federated Church as a beneficiary on an insurance policy, your 401k plan or employer pension, in your estate plans, or in your will.
- Potentially avoid capital gains taxes by making a gift of stock.
- Individuals 70 ½ and older can meet their required minimum distribution (RMD) from an IRA by making a gift directly to Federated.
- Make a donation through a charitable trust, a donor advised fund, or foundation.

Planned gifts such as these, when designated to the church's Legacy Fund, have an impact over a longer period of time. The Legacy Fund acts as our Endowment Fund, which provides a certain percentage of its assets each year to the church's general operating fund, while the funds are invested. The higher the dollars in our Legacy Fund, the greater the impact to the general operating fund, which supports our operations, ministries, and mission work.

Faith Formation

January/Epiphany Sermon Series

The season after Christmastide in the church begins with the celebration of the visit of the Magi to Jesus, on January 6, after the 12 days of Christmas. This event is known as "Epiphany," which literally means revelation, or realization, and celebrates the revelation of the Christ to those who traveled so far to find him.

This year, the actual feast of Epiphany falls on a **Sunday, January 6**. On that Sunday we will use the One Communion Sunday Prototype (*read more at* <u>fedchurch.org/rise-prototypes</u>). We will offer Communion, anointing and release during this first service of the new year, **and will only have** *one service* **at** 10:00 **am** to gather our whole church family.

The first Sunday after Epiphany, January 13, we will go back to two services, our traditional service at 10:00 am, and our RISE to Shine service at 11:30 am. We will begin a sermon series on "Sacred Signposts," inspired by the book of that same title written by Benjamin J. Dueholm. Sacred Signposts follows a list that Martin Luther identified as seven "holy possessions" of the Christian faith. There are as follows: Word, Water, Meal, Confession and Forgiveness, Ministry, Prayer, Praise and Worship, and Cross. These are practices that shape us as Christians. In order to know, to worship, to engage the transcendent God we believe in, we need particular practices. At the core of the Epiphany season is a willingness to open ourselves to finding God anew in the many ways that God appears to us, to open ourselves to the many "epiphanies" that come our way that we might otherwise never even notice. These sacred signposts help guide us along that journey.

We will follow the lectionary readings connected with the themes of the book as follows. We hope you will join us for this series, and gain a deeper understanding of our Christian practices, and a deeper awareness of God's presence and love.

Life is very difficult for those on the edge, especially in the winter. Social services are getting harder and harder to access. This is why St. Paul's is such a welcoming refuge from cold and hunger. With donated food and funds, we can provide two hot lunches a week, as well as mutual support and friendship. - By fostering a deeper sense of connection: connection to God, to each other, and to the world in which we live.
- By unleashing their imagination and creativity as a sense of purpose propels them to make a difference.

Communion to the Confined Ministry

The Communion to the Confined Ministry, coordinated by Peggie Jo Shinigawa, started in 2012 and is overseen by the Congregational Care Commission. Its mission is to provide communion to individuals who are mentally or physically unable to attend worship and partake in the sacrament of communion with the congregation on Sunday mornings.

This ministry is conducted by trained individuals who visit with the confined, hopefully on the same Sunday that communion was served in the Sanctuary. In addition to bringing the communion elements, flowers from the Flower Ministry may also be taken, as well as a bulletin. The

first time that a server makes a visit, a card is also handed to the recipient. Read this lovely quote from their card.

"You are a child of God and a cherished member of our community of faith with whom we humbly share this sacred meal. The communion elements that we bring have been

blessed during worship, and have heard prayers of the people and songs of praise at the Federated Church in Chagrin Falls."

The recipients experience the love of God and the love of Federated toward its extended faith family. In this way, the servers physically embody the living spirit of God by their presence to individuals who cannot attend worship.


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As of January 2019, there will be 16 communion servers who consistently check in with 18 recipients to see if they wish to receive communion that month. This means that communion is served beyond our walls well over 180 times a year! At the same time that they are performing a service which is so vital to our faith, the servers themselves are transformed. It is not only a blessing to the recipients, but to those who serve them. Many times Peggie Jo has heard from servers that they immensely enjoy their visits with the recipients and delight in hearing and sharing their life stories and journey.

Do you remember Hal Maskiell and Gail Magnuson? They were communion servers before moving to Florida. Once they found a new church home, they asked Peggie Jo about how this ministry functions, so that they could begin a similar ministry there. What a blessing it is that we can minister to our faith community and friends – wherever they are!
