Just over one year ago, fourteen students died in Parkland, Florida, inspiring marches, new laws and widespread calls to stop the onslaught of gun deaths. But in the year since, nearly 1,200 more children alone have lost their lives to guns in this country.

Moms Demand Action for Gun Sense in America is a grassroots movement of American mothers fighting for public safety measures that respect the Second Amendment and protect people from gun violence. Since its inception after the tragedy at Sandy Hook Elementary, Moms Demand Action has established a chapter in every state.

The Moms Demand Action Be SMART campaign was launched to take action to promote responsible gun ownership and reduce child gun deaths. The campaign focuses on education and awareness about child gun deaths and responsible gun storage. Moms encourage parents and caretakers to "Be SMART" and take these five simple steps to help prevent shootings by children:

Secure all guns in your home and vehicles; **Model** responsible behavior around guns;

Ask about the presence of unsecured guns in other homes;

Recognize the risks of teen suicide;

Tell your peers to be SMART.

From Hamilton's Desk

Dear Friends,

Not long ago, after our sanctuary had undergone such a beautiful renovation, a Federated member donated new Bibles for each pew. From a theological and linguistic standpoint, these new Bibles were long overdue. The current translation (the New Revised Standard Version) is fresher, more accurate, and noticeably easier to understand. I am grateful for that gift.

The new gift by no means negates the old gift, though. As I reflect on the arc of a church's life, I find I am immensely grateful also for the gift of the earlier red Bibles which we have just replaced. Undoubtedly, some of you contributed to the purchase of those earlier volumes. And I want to say a late thank you for the gift some of you made 54 years ago. Those previous volumes have nourished members and friends of Federated for more than half a century.

What I'm struck by in the gifts of these two respective editions of the Bible is three things. First, it reminds me how important generosity is. At different stages of this church's life, people have seen fit to share their resources with the church. They have taught and sung and knit and served meals and built buildings and visited people and worked for justice. It's these gestures of love that have built Federated into the church it is today. What would we be without them?

Second, the replacement of one gift by another is a vivid reminder of how transitory life is. Decades ago, people gave gifts that were an important part of Federated's life. As time went by, though, those gifts had served their purpose and needed to be changed. The same is true in every dimension of Federated's

life. None of the church's early buildings still stand. Many of the people who have been visited and to whom meals have been taken have died. The notes of earlier choirs were momentary. The messages of past sermons have long since vanished.

And we might well ask, "Why do any of it—why build buildings and give financial gifts and serve people in need?" And the reason is: because we can't *not* do it. Our lives would be much the poorer if we didn't live gratefully and lovingly. The fact that all our gifts are eventually supplanted is not a reason not to give. In fact, it's all the more reason to give again and again.

The only real measure of our discipleship is not whether our gifts last for all eternity. It's not even whether anyone remembers those gifts years later. The only real measure of our life's quality is: did we live generously and gratefully? Did we, in each moment, remember what a gift God has given us in life; and did we seek to live generously in return. Gratitude for what we've been given and lavish giving in return is the mark of a life lived faithfully and well.

As we begin the season of Lent on March 6, may we turn again and again to God, the source of all our gifts, the wonder of our lives. And may we live extravagantly generous lives in return.

Church Council News

Council met on January 29 in order to approve the 2019 annual budget in time for the Annual Meeting on February 10. Thanks to the meticulous delineation and calculations of our Finance Committee as well as Council's comprehensive discussion and recommendations a balanced budget was ready to propose to the congregation. Recognizing our congregation's increasing need for pastoral care, outreach communications, and responsible stewardship the budget was set up to respond to those growth points. In addition, Council approved to assign the 2018 surplus to pay the 2019 allotment of principal on our loan payments. The aim is to retire that loan in three years.

While Trinkets 'N Treasures gears up for another fundraising event in April, we are blessed to learn of their commitment to fund the part-time groundskeepers, ongoing, for the Family Life Center and Bell Street properties! Bundles of thanks go to all who contribute time and treasures.

A yearly church-wide theme can unify the staff and congregation with common messaging across the work of the church. It can reinforce our shared values and principles. It can even motivate ways to think and act together and build curiosity for others to want to know more about Federated. In preparation for the Staff and Lay Leaders' Strategic Planning Retreat (March 2), the Telling Our Story Commission presented Council with proposals for a yearly multi-criteria process by which we can select each year's theme. Church leadership will begin in March to plan ways to build echoes of a common message throughout the 2019-2020 program year. (Watch for news of the new theme later this year!)

Church Council remains focused in 2019 on forward visioning for our church community. This coming year, task forces seek to answer the question of how we can responsibly optimize our three properties in alignment to our church's mission. Any decision of substantial change in ownership or use of property will be brought to the congregation. We continue to advance our "2020 priority," envisioning how to engage youth, children and families by being more responsive to what matters in their lives today.

The Federated Church continues to make a difference in lives near and far! Vibrant ministries such as SJAM, Wondrous Wednesdays, Colorado Kids, Work Camps, Angel Ministries, St. Paul's Ministries, Chagrin Falls Park Ministries, Stephen Ministries, Homeless Stand Down and so much more deepen our understandings, challenge our assumptions, and call us into partnerships and relationships of grace and humility. Face-to-face, we continue to discover God's grace through active and empathetic listening and by standing side-by-side in the suffering. Our faith community responds with full heart and soul! God is at work!

It has been a privilege to serve God and our congregation as Moderator. Fortunately, not one of us stands alone. The body of Christ is evident in the dedicated staff, lay leaders and congregants who sacrifice time, talents, and treasures every day to provide a safe and compelling space for discovering God's mystery in ordinary days. Thank you to all!

Not only will this improve work life for our ministry staff, it will make it easier for our church family


to connect with each other, keep up with what's going on, and grow as a connected community.

Faith Formation

Lenten Sermon Series

Our Lenten sermon series is inspired by What We Talk About When We Talk About God by Rev. Rob Bell, the One Book, One Community book chosen by the Spiritual Formation Commission. We encourage as many as are able to read the book, and to join a book group (listed at fedchurch.org/events/bookstudies) to reflect on and discuss the themes. Bell describes God as "the reverence humming within us" and challenges us to dive deeper into our understanding of who God is for us in our present world. He uses five words to guide those reflections, which we will echo in worship throughout the season of Lent. They are: Open, Both, With, For, Ahead and So. We pray that pondering these words may lead us to deeper understanding of and connection with God, and with each other. Here are the themes and scriptures on which we will focus:

March 10— Theme: Open. Scripture: Romans 10:8b-13 and Luke 4:1-13

March 17— Theme: Both. Scripture: Psalm 27 and Luke 13:31-35

March 24— Theme: With. Scripture: Isaiah 55:1-9 and Luke 13:1-9

March 31— Theme: For. Scripture: II Corinthians 5:16-21 and Luke 15:1-3, 11b-32

April 7— Theme: Ahead. Scripture: Isaiah 43:16-21 and John 12:1-8 April 14— Theme: So. Scripture: Luke 19:28-40 and Luke 23:1-49

Come and journey with us through these themes, come and deepen your sense of who God is and how God loves, come and connect with others to make this Lenten season a time of rich spiritual blessing and growth.

Telling Our Story Spotlight

Scouts at Federated

If you're ever at the church on Tuesday evening, you'll notice that it is "Scout" day at Federated. Sponsoring both a Pack and a Troop is a wonderful ministry of our church.

As sponsors of Troop and Pack 150, our buildings host weekly and monthly meetings for the entire Pack, the Cub Scout Dens, as well as the Troop. Currently, there are 49 Cub Scouts and their families involved in Pack 150 and 23 Boy Scouts and their families involved in the Troop. Last fall, the Pack recruited kindergarten students and girls to join in the scouting experience for the first time.

The church not only hosts regular meetings, but also special scouting events, like the recent Eagle Court of Honor for Patrick Carroll and Matthew Suzelis. For his Eagle Scout project Patrick led a group who built a run-in shed at Fieldstone Farm Therapeutic Riding Center and Matthew led a group who built a wheelchair deck adjacent to the train track at Santa's Hide-a-Way Hollow. These two projects represent the pinnacle of the leadership, social, and outdoor adventure skills that a young person can learn through the BSA. Since 1950 almost 100 youth have earned the Eagle Scout rank through Troop 150 at Federated Church. Feel free to view the list on display in our Fellowship Hall!

Although Troop 150 has been in existence (off and on) since

1924, its association with The Federated Church started in 1953, when the church's Men's Club became the troop's sponsor. Each year the sponsoring organization renews its charter with its troop and/or pack. Larry Trace has been active on the Troop 150 charter at Federated since 1974. He is a wealth of information and guidance for the scouts here at the church, as evidenced by his presentation of the Mentor Pin during Patrick Carroll's Eagle Court of Honor.

During his sermons, we've heard about Hamilton's work with

young scouts as they earn the God and Family pin. That's just one example of the way in which Federated can reach out to the Scouts and the Scouts can reach out to the church, to the benefit of both. There has lately been a nice convergence of church members who are the leaders of our Scout units: church member Bob Leibold is the Troop 150 Scoutmaster and church member Thaddeus Quintin is the Pack 150 Cubmaster. As Federated continues its focus on programming for children, youth, and families through its Family Ministries, there is an opportunity for more engagement between Federated, the Pack, and the Troop - where both organizations continue to





benefit. Amen to that!


Federated's Pilgrimage to the Holy Land & Jordan

- (7) They can attend the free Turning Point class on Wednesday to connect with peers who are breaking the cycle of addiction.


