From Hamilton's Desk

Dear Friends,

With two notable staff changes happening at the same time, I want to say a word about Associate Pastor, the Rev. Susi Kawolics, who leaves after eight years here, and Senior Director of Operations, Amy Eugene, who leaves after nearly three years here. They have both been enormous gifts to Federated, and I want to express my gratitude and appreciation for their work and their presence.

In thinking about Susi and Amy, three words come to mind that characterize the service of both of them here.

The first is **Commitment**. Susi has led our planning of worship and has invested herself in every aspect of it. She has worked closely with our Stephen Ministry program, with our Social Justice Advocacy Ministry, and with the Chagrin Valley Council of Churches. She has led memorial services, performed weddings, visited church members and friends, and so much more.

Amy, likewise, has been involved in nearly every aspect of church life, staffing our Properties, Human Resources, and Finance Committees, supporting staff in their many and various needs, running from overflowing toilets to contracts with vendors to interviewing and hiring custodial staff. She has had stints working as part-time bookkeeper and as part-time lead custodian in her time here, and so much more.

For both of them, the work has been nearly never-ending. So I both want to acknowledge the toll their work has taken and the exhaustion they have both expressed in leaving, and, at the same time, to express our gratitude for the diligence and commitment they have exhibited. Federated owes them a huge debt.

The second word that comes to me about both Susi and Amy is **Partnership**. Nothing, for either of them, is about ego. They both spend enormous energy connecting people to each other and to ministries that will fulfill them. Susi has partnered with SJAM and Stephen Ministry and everyone who shares in worship leadership. Amy has partnered with the committees she staffs, with the church staff, and with Church Council. And both of them have been, for me, exceptionally close partners in the day-to-day work and ministry of the church. I have deeply treasured both partnerships.

The third word that comes to me about them is **Joy**. Each of them radiates an energy and spirit for life that are contagious. They laugh readily and exude a deep delight and revel in the deep mysteries and graces of life. Both of them look for solutions rather than just identify problems. They create and transmit an infectious spirit. They leave their mark, and they make their communities better places.

Along with countless Federated members and friends, I will miss Susi and Amy greatly. I am abundantly grateful for their deep commitment to Federated, for their work as partners in service to the good news of God, and for the radiance they exude. I wish them both God's peace as they move into new chapters of their life. May God always hold them close.


News & Info

Every quarter, a group of folks meet to determine: Capital Campaign Projects - Where Are We Now? Keith Mast, Becky Gruss, Amy Eugene, Laura Taylor, and Janis Stefanchik met in December to make sure that we are keeping track of all campaign payments that are coming in, paying all capital campaign project bills, and monitoring the progress of each capital campaign project that was approved by Church Council.

Regarding the capital campaign projects, the goal of the operations staff and the Properties Committee is to focus on the following projects in 2020:

- · Installing a key card entry system,
- · Renovating and replacing bathroom fixtures,
- Reupholstering the final six conference room chairs that currently reside in the Sanctuary,
- · Purchasing an altar cross,
- · Replacing more Bell Street carpeting,
- · Conducting a sound study,
- Installing additional blinds in the Sanctuary,
- Continuing the transition to cost-effective LED lights and safer electrical systems,
- · Allocating funds for Deferred Major Maintenance and Equipment, and
- Resurfacing the Bell Street parking lot including evaluating whether there are funds to install a heated section under the entrance/exit ramp hill.

In the meantime, recently completed work entailed patching and repairing the west stairs. This is one of those campaign projects that isn't necessarily aesthetically interesting, but is so vital to the safe and efficient running of our buildings.


After over two decades and 17 trips to South Africa, I have compiled a book of stories and accounts of life during and after Apartheid in South Africa. The book, When Mourning Turned into Dancing: Seeds of Hope in Post-Apartheid South Africa, is being offered to Federated members and friends for \$14 (nearly at cost from the retail price of \$18.95) in deep appreciation for how much Federated is part of this story.

In our missions in South Africa, in the presence of the over 180 missionaries we have sent on work camps over the years, and in deep appreciation from me, I want to acknowledge that Federated is a key part of the book. The title of the book is taken from Psalm 30:11 which says, "You have turned my mourning into dancing; you have taken off my sackcloth and clothed me with joy."

Copies are available after church in Fellowship Hall at the display table. As I am part of the RISE to Shine service, I am only able to greet folks for a few minutes between services. 100% Renewable Electricity. Did you know that you can switch your electric energy to 100% renewable energy? Yes, it's available for everyone! Ask for the fixed rate and 100% renewable electricity. To opt-in call the NOPEC customer care line at 855.667.3201. It's a great way to care for the earth.

Winter Energy Saving Tips

Take Advantage of Heat from the Sun - Open curtains on your south-facing windows during the day to allow sunlight to naturally heat your home, and close them at night.

Cover Drafty Windows - Tightly seal them with clear plastic sheets covering the frames.

Adjust the Temperature - When you are home and awake, set your thermostat as low as is comfortable. When you are asleep or out of the house, turn your thermostat back 10° to 15° for eight hours and save around 10% a year on your heating and cooling bills.

Find and Seal Leaks - Seal the air leaks around utility cut-throughs for pipes, gaps around chimneys and recessed lights in insulated ceilings, and unfinished spaces behind cupboards and closets.

Reduce Heat Loss from the Fireplace - Keep the damper closed when it is not in use. Close the doors leading into the room. **Lower Your Water Heating Temp** - Turn down the temperature of your water heater to the warm setting (120°F).

A message from the parish nurse

This is a story of serendipity that I want to share. Before our first snow and ice event in November, a Federated member donated a bunch of fleece blankets, scarves, AND two brand new winter jackets for boys. I didn't look at the sizes at the time, because I didn't know who would show up in need of boys' outerwear. I then gave them to Bob, a volunteer in St. Paul's Thrift Shop, as he gets most of the requests for outer clothes and coats, etc. (while I get requests for underwear and socks).

About ½ hour later, Bob came to my office. He was so happy and excited, I could see he was bursting to tell me something. It seems that just after Bob received those coats from me, a Puerto Rican family came to his shop. The family had been displaced by Hurricane Maria, and finally made their way up to Cleveland. Bob and I don't know how they found St. Paul's, but they were in desperate need of winter coats for their two sons. Like so many "coincidences" here, the two jackets that had just been donated fit those two boys perfectly – and everyone, including me, was elated. Imagine their discomfort with their first winter! What a joy to be able to help.

There are other things that St. Paul's Outreach Ministry did that benefited this family: help with paperwork (driver's license or state ID, Social Security, bus passes, housing vouchers), food supplies from our pantry, backpacks, resources for medical care, etc.

And thanks to the many donations, we also offer thermal underwear, regular underwear, hygiene supplies, and first aid. By the end of next month we will have given out 110 sets of thermal underwear and 100 pairs of heavy duty winter boots, the latter courtesy of Avon UCC!

And so, I humbly thank you all for your tremendous and ongoing support for our sister church. May you all have a meaningful and special New Year, blessed to be blessings.

St. Paul's Food Need

Ohio City Power, managed by Lisa Braun (former Primetime coordinator), collects food donations to be used by a cook at St. Paul's Community Church in preparation of lunches (Soup for the Soul). These lunch meals provide food for the needy from the area around St. Paul's. For some folks, this may be the only meal of the day. About 40-60 people partake daily.

While there is a regular supply of bagels (donated by Einstein's, collected by Jane Biggar), donations of other items for meal preparations are now in short supply. The most needed item is meat of various kinds (e.g. poultry, beef, pork, bacon, sausage). Eggs are needed, also (arrange for delivery in advance). Donations would be greatly appreciated.

If you are inclined to help the needy in this way, you may put your donation in the chest freezer in the tunnel at Federated Church labeled clearly OCP and advise Kathy or Don. The food is transported to St. Paul's weekly by Kathy Kolcaba (parish nurse) or Don Hoke.
