### **2020 Homeless Stand Down Recap**

A heartfelt thanks to our volunteer team for the 2020 Homeless Stand Down. Our team of 18 was so kind and welcoming to all who attended; it was truly another wonderful way to reach out and touch those in such need. This year a total of 1,487 guests were served at the Homeless Stand Down (HSD), including 256 veterans, and there are so many stories we heard from them.

Because of you, our Federated family, we collected over \$1,000 to go toward much-needed warm winter jackets and boots. If you see one of our volunteers in a church service, coffee hour, or at a meeting, please ask them what stood out to them about our afternoon at the "Hands on" Stand Down. There were so many FREE services offered, such as a hot meal, warm weather gear, haircuts (and shaves), flu shots, medical professionals to consult, legal consulting, a photo ID. Health services included podiatrist services and even mammograms for women, and more. And what many said they valued so sincerely was also the opportunity to be in community, and be surrounded by so many smiles and warm, caring people.

# From Hamilton's Desk

Dear Friends,

With the month of February comes the time for Federated's Annual Meeting. Set this year for Sunday, February 23, that meeting is, on several fronts, an opportunity.

First, at the meeting we will pass a budget for the 2020 church year. It's a budget that will fund programs and support staff and reach out to serve the wider community and pay for supplies and utilities. The budget is an expression of our priorities and our values. It's a visible, physical way to show what matters to us. If you have made a pledge to support this budget, thank you! It's a gift that makes a palpable difference in the world. If you have not yet made a pledge, I invite you to do so. With our pledges, we have the opportunity to share from our abundance. And with the budget we put together, we have the opportunity to shape the world with the values of God—to strive for a world in which justice and love are at the forefront. What could be better?

Second, at the meeting we will make some decisions about the future of our facilities. Some church members would like to sell one of our facilities. Others would like to develop the Family Life Center into the Community Life Collaborative. When feelings are strong, it can sometimes be difficult to find common ground. Church at its best, though, continues to seek a way that all can live with. When we compromise, we can sometimes feel as though we've lost something dear to us. When we reframe the dilemma, though, we remember that a shared way, in which each of us both gives up something and receives something, can be the greatest way of all.

Third, and related to that need to compromise, we have the chance, at our Annual Meeting, to be the community Christ calls us to be. We get to be in the same space together—to laugh together, to cry together, to listen carefully, to reason things out, and maybe most of all, to remember that our strength isn't in our individual righteousness but in our collective and shared bonds. It doesn't really matter how right I am about any particular issue. I may be the most right person in the history of the world, and if I'm that by myself, my life is poverty-stricken. Far more important than being right is being kind, being loving, being forgiving: "Blest be the tie that binds our hearts in Christian love."

Last, our Annual Meeting gives us the chance, once again, to return to God as the source of our vitality and joy. If it all depends only on us, we will accomplish little. Our strength will be sapped, our energy will flag, our sense of purpose will waver. When we rely on the Holy One who gives us life, though, we will be renewed and blessed. "Those who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength, they shall mount up with wings like eagles, they shall run and not be weary, they shall walk and not faint" (Isaiah 40:31).

May we gather at our Annual Meeting with exuberant joy and a deep sense of purpose.

### A Message From Church Council

Throughout most of 2019, the Church Council and appointed task forces have spent time in discovery and research regarding the Family Life Center. In November, a letter went out to the congregation with summaries of reports from the "Additional Possibilities Task Force" and the "Real Estate Task Force."

Four listening sessions – on December 1, 7, 8 & 15 – were held at the church and congregation members were invited to hear the task force presentations in person and to ask questions and share thoughts about the ideas. These questions from those who attended were gathered and became part of the on-going work. Also in December, a combined group from the task forces, called the Joint Task Force Recommendation Team, began meeting to see if there was a way to pursue the new use idea, proposed by an emerging non-profit organization, in a way that accomplished the financial goals needed for sustainability.

The Church Council plans to bring a recommendation with information to the congregation at the Annual Meeting on February 23 at 12:45 pm. We ask for your continued prayers for all of those working to bring about needed change that will add support to our staff and programs at Federated.

### Paper Recycling at the FLC on Break

For several years, Federated Church has participated in a paper recycling program with the Abitibi Company. There was a small return on our recycling program. On December 18, 2019, Abitibi went out of business and sold the collection dumpsters to Rumpke Waste & Recycling Company. Rumpke had a recycling program but there is a charge for the service.

The Properties Committee directed staff to contact Rumpke to pick up the dumpsters and to not enroll Federated Church in their recycling program. The Social Justice Advocacy Ministry (SJAM) will examine other ways to participate in sustainable practices. The SJAM Environmental Justice Team will keep us all updated.

### Love Thy Neighbor – Federated In Action

On December 9, Federated Church began providing space to a "homeschooling resource" that had been operating at Kelly's Working Well Farm on South Franklin Street in Bainbridge Township. It is called the Chagrin Valley School and was shut down earlier this fall by Bainbridge officials and the Bainbridge Fire Department. What was thought to be a misunderstanding that could be guickly resolved has turned into something much more lengthy which now includes court proceedings.

The students from the school, ranging in age from preschool to 17 years, were in need of a space to meet while this is being resolved, so the Federated staff decided to offer them Rooms 230 and 240, Monday-Friday from 8 am to 5:30 pm. After taking a look at the rooms, the teachers and kids decided that they did indeed want to take advantage of our offer and rent space here.

This school caters to homeschooling families and usually offers a curriculum focused on farming and animals, so our village location is not ideal for them. They are anxious to return to the farm. But until things are sorted out with the officials in Bainbridge, that cannot happen.

The staff members of the school are very grateful to have classroom space at Federated. Federated staff members are enjoying the youthful presence of the students and their families as they use the otherwise empty rooms.

So if you are in the building during the week and hear the excited chatter of children in the stairwell or some thumping overhead while you are meeting in the Lounge, know that those are the sounds of Federated helping a neighbor in need.

### **Parish Nurse Corner**

After a two-week closing of St. Paul's (except for church services and Loaves & Fishes), I was eager to hear how some of my regular clients had spent their holidays. One story stands out: Wayne was so grateful that New Year's Eve was *quiet*. When I asked him what he meant, he said, "Only a few gunshots in the evening, and then only a pop-pop-pop [of a gun] after midnight. I could actually sleep in my apartment most of the night." He described the usual amount of gunshots as "endless." He lives in a HUD apartment on the near west side, near the lake and he walks to St. Paul's for spiritual and practical support, a trip of about five miles. He talks to me because we have developed a trusting relationship which started when I made a special effort to bring him a pair of boots from home that I thought would fit. Even though the boots were too small, he was comforted by the fact that I had tried, and that I had remembered him over my two-week absence.

Most of my clients cannot benefit from the Homeless Stand Down in which Federated so generously participates. Why? Because they have no means of transportation. Bus passes are too expensive, and if they have one from one of the charities, the bus routes are rarely convenient. They don't own cars nor do most of their friends. For the most part, they are working low wage jobs and/ or living on the streets. Life is made harder when their supplies for daily living are stolen while they sleep in shelters, or even go to the bathroom. And yet, at St. Paul's, there is laughter in the halls. The community of impoverished people is tightly knit and knows how to enjoy each other. A little compassion gives them courage and hope.

Our most pressing needs right now are gloves, hand warmers, hygiene kits, underwear, and toilet paper. (There is a large box in the Lobby for your donations). I welcome anyone who would like to visit or volunteer. Thank you for all that you do!
