Addressing COVID-19 at Federated A Note from Operations

It is already November and what a whirlwind! So many of you have reached out to share thoughts and offer new ideas. Some of you have made generous donations that have allowed us to do special projects, such as our livestreaming and much needed maintenance and aesthetic upgrades to the building. Our staff is busy implementing these changes and coming up with ideas to broaden our outreach and provide members with new avenues for worship. Our Outdoor Prayer Services have been successful - small in numbers, but extremely fulfilling for those who participate. The beautiful wooden prayer cross, imagined by our staff and brought to life by John Biel, provides a sacred place for prayers and thoughts. We also recently installed a blue box outside the parking lot doors for prayer requests to be incorporated into our Fellowship of Prayer and Pastoral Care. Many other projects are in process. The building may be closed, but the church remains open.

Some of you have expressed frustration with not being able to meet in small groups; others are missing worship in truly profound ways. It was a very difficult decision to remain closed through the end of the year. Even more difficult has been saying 'no' to those of you who have asked to meet in the church building. Churches exist to serve the community and right now some of you feel Federated is not fulfilling that duty because the building is closed, and while we very much hope our members are able to see Federated Church as more than a building, understandably, questions loom. Is it wise to keep the church building closed when other churches are open? Are we going to lose members of the congregation? Are members suffering as a result of not being together?

Some suggest we open for worship services and those who want to come would and those who feel unsafe would stay home. To do this would require clergy, staff, choirs and other volunteers to put themselves and their families at great risk. There remains a 10-person maximum for indoor gatherings and although churches are granted an exception, that exception is not in keeping with medical recommendations. Some have asked about opening for small group events. If one group is allowed to meet inside the building, then fairness dictates all groups be invited. Even small group gatherings would require pre-registration and pre-screening for potential COVID-19 exposure; on the day of the event there would be mandatory temperature checks, masks, hand sanitizer, gloves and proper distancing. Only one group would be permitted to meet at a time. After each gathering a thorough cleaning would be necessary. Following every event, attendees would be required to watch for specific symptoms and immediately report a positive COVID-19 test result. Everyone in attendance would then be notified, as would the custodial staff, clergy and anyone else who entered the building during or after the exposure. Participants would inform their families and anyone else potentially exposed. Having one small group event is a danger. Having multiple daily events would be challenging to administer and track, and more importantly, doing so would be irresponsible of us as a community leader.

The COVID-19 conditions are evolving and despite mask and distancing rules, cases are again on the rise; additional spikes are expected as weather gets colder and flu season begins. Other countries are going back into lockdown and many states have implemented a 14-day quarantine for travelers from 35+ states where COVID-19 cases are on the rise, including Ohio. There is some positive news regarding forward movement with a vaccine and availability of distribution once it is ready. We will continue to consult with medical and public health officials and rely on the scientific understanding of this virus to make decisions going forward.

In the meantime, and most importantly, we will work diligently to find new and creative opportunities for spiritual growth, learning, reflection, worship, and connection with each other. Thank you to those of you who have already reached out to offer your thoughts, challenges, support, to volunteer and to offer financial gifts as we navigate the current situation and beyond. Your generosity gives us all the strength and confidence that anything is possible.

From Church Council

Wow, how things have changed since our 2020 Annual Meeting on February 23! I know I couldn't have imagined then where we would be right now, but here we are. We presented a couple of important things during that meeting and I would like to provide an update.

Collaboration with the CLC

As you will recall, we held a congregation-wide vote to approve the Church Council's recommendation that we seek a "partnership" (not in the legal sense) with the Community Life Collaborative (CLC) to lease the Family Life Center (FLC), pending the agreed upon terms of a lease. Those members who were present voted overwhelmingly to approve this recommendation. Shortly after, things across the country began to shut down due to COVID-19, and these shut-downs, along with the drastic change in general work practices, caused there to be some understandable delays for both the CLC and the Church in moving forward. However, work did begin and a lease agreement was being developed.

During this work, it was advised that the Church would need to seek permission to amend the existing Conditional Use Permit of the FLC from the Bainbridge Zoning Board before going into a lease agreement with another entity. We submitted an application and representatives from CLC and the Church presented the request during the August meeting of the board. Unfortunately, the request was not met with a positive response and many questions were raised, given that the FLC is in a Residential zone. So rather than risk a denial of the request, which would be voted on at the September Zoning Board meeting, both the CLC and Federated chose to withdraw the application.

We are now working together to reach an alternate arrangement that would satisfy the spirit of the collaboration and allow us to move ahead with the important community outreach work, as well as the need for the CLC to assume financial responsibility for the FLC, which has not yet begun. The CLC has been asked to present an updated plan to the Church Council at our November meeting.

Challenging Trend in Membership and Pledges

Also during the 2020 Annual Meeting, we discussed the decline of both membership and pledges over the last 10 or so years. The Finance Committee reported that, although Federated remained in a fairly strong cash position, this was mostly due to unfilled staff positions. This same scenario remains true here in the final quarter of the year: expenses have remained low, partially due to the COVID-19 closure, and while pledges are mostly on budget, non-pledge giving and rental revenue (FLC and 102 Bell St.) are significantly below budget.

Additionally, the church has absorbed expenses of the FLC beyond what was budgeted. So while our current financial position is stable, we acknowledge that the overall financial structure, which is based on member pledges, is not sustainable for our longterm future. As outlined during the Annual Meeting, we are taking a three-pronged approach to address this: 1) work to increase revenue through pledges (Stewardship), 2) engage a visioning process to ultimately restructure our resources (Convergence consultancy), and 3) partner with the CLC to use the FLC to expand community outreach that potentially increases membership. I am pleased to say that all of these things are currently underway despite the worldwide pandemic in which we are living.

We continue to seek God's guidance in all that we do, putting the best interest and healthy future of our church at the forefront of the work.

Rejoice & Renew Capital Campaign Project Update

So many good "next steps" came from a recent Capital Campaign Projects Committee meeting thanks to the hard work of Becky Gruss, Keith Mast, Melissa Owen, Janis Stefanchik, and Laura Taylor. It's an exciting time for the *Rejoice & Renew* capital campaign as folks are continuing to fulfill their capital campaign pledges. With those funds in hand, our projects are continuing:

- The Rebranding Sub-committee of the Telling Our Story Commission, led by Diana Weber Gardner, has been working with consulting firm OrgStory to develop and execute a new brand to position Federated for its second century. As the interviews, focus sessions, and survey came to a close in October, they reviewed the findings in a presentation with OrgStory and this month are working on Brand strategy and Identity development.
- Senior Director of People & Operations Melissa Owen continued her work implementing our livestreaming equipment needs by improving lighting for the Chancel area of the Sanctuary. At the same time, she'll have new window blinds or shades installed for the Sanctuary that will also affect the lighting and will be a blessed relief to

those sitting in the pews once we're holding in-person services again! This is an important campaign project as it was a funded Giving Opportunity – a couple associated their pledge to the campaign with this particular project.

- In addition to the church's A/V needs, Melissa will be working with the administration staff, the operations staff, and custodial crew to:
 - Replace the bathroom fixtures. Five hands-free faucets are being installed each month and hands-free dryers will come next.
 - Upgrade the church's computer server before its shelf-life has expired!
 - Begin transitioning the outdoor lights to energy-efficient LED fixtures.
- Melissa will work with a vendor to update the carpeting on the first-floor hallway and a good portion of the main stairwell, complementing our new carpet in the Lobby and Sanctuary.

Voting Rights—A Message from the Moderators

The work of SJAM around Election Engagement has been very thoughtful and impactful and we want to express our support. SJAM (Social and Environmental Justice Group), a ministry group of the Mission and Service Commission, focuses their work on understanding and responding to the issues of justice: social justice, racial justice, economic justice, environmental justice. These issues affect our lives and the lives of others in our community, and we believe God requires us, as Christians, to take a stance. Throughout their activities, SJAM is careful to present the issues but does not focus on a political party. The recent work of voter registration and education is not partisan and in their communication they focus on defending the underserved and vulnerable -- a shared value. SJAM has focused on

access to voting, which is an issue of social justice. As Christians, we seek God's guidance and call in the whole of our lives, as was beautifully expressed in Hamilton's sermon this past week. Therefore, we must work toward justice, inclusion, mercy, and compassion -- in our faith witness, our sermons and conversations, our whole and messy lives. These Christian values sometimes get connected with parties and politics, but that is not the intention of SJAM or Federated Church. The goal is to make witness to and embody God's love and acceptance of all people.

Telling Our Story Spotlight

New Prayer Cross

At a staff meetings, Kiersti Critchfield, our Pastoral Care Associate, mentioned her desire to start a Prayer Cross ministry during these times of isolation. It would be a way to leave our meditations, thoughts and considerations anonymously when we can't come inside into the Sanctuary or Chapel.

When she directed the young children's Faith Formation Ministry at Federated, Kiersti wanted a small mailbox on a stand – a place for our Sunday School children to leave their private thoughts and messages on Sunday mornings to "mail to God." Knowing his interest in woodworking, she asked John Biel to make her one, and it turned out wonderful, so she looked to him again with her new idea.

Kiersti envisioned a portable cross - one that could withstand the outside elements, but designed to handle flowers, garlands, or ribbons draped around/throughout it. The cross needed a support stand and slats to hold the inserted meditation slips – both at a relatively tall level and at a shorter level, for adults and children alike. After John and Kiersti's initial discussions, John got to work designing the cross with those needs in mind.

It took two weeks for the cross to be completed. To handle the Northeast Ohio weather, John chose cedar wood – leaving it unvarnished so that the wood appears the way that God grew the tree from which it came. The cross slats are held together with several supporting/ connecting pieces whose layout is very intentional - the vertical ones face upwards and the horizontal ones face inwards, representing our inward support from God and our upward connection to God.

Once completed, there was a blessing ceremony of the cross on September 30 with John and Marilee Biel present. They were able to offer up the first prayers inserted into the cross. Pastors Hamilton and Mark blessed the cross and anointed it with oil. Check out a recording of the ceremony on Federated's YouTube Channel! (youtube.com/TheFederatedChurch)

John has been delightfully surprised at how much attention the Prayer Cross has gotten: attending the Prayer Cross blessing and receiving quite a few calls about it from fellow members. He was thrilled to make a contribution to Federated during this time when folks can feel so removed from the church and our congregation. What a nice way to bring folks together safely and continue to feel part of a community.

Prayer is an important part of our spiritual life. Federated knows how important this communication is to each one of us and wants to give congregants more opportunities to further invite God into our lives through prayer. Initially the cross has been placed outside of the church's front doors facing Bell Street, underneath the portico. Church members and community members alike are encouraged to write their prayer requests down on a piece of paper (paper will not be provided) and come to the church, roll up your prayer request and slip it into a slot inside the wooden cross. These prayers are completely anonymous, will not be read, and will only be known to the One Great Creator. You can then take as much time as you would like to stand and pray or meditate while this holy symbol watches over you. Allow this sacred space to be a time of refuge and renewal for your soul.

Parish Nurse Corner

On October 28, Leslie Fincun called me to say she had the supplies in her car that were donated to the Parish Nurse Clinic over the weekend. These supplies were in response to a "Drive" organized by the Mission and Service Commission for commonly used items in the clinic for which I provided a lengthy list. When I saw what she had, I was stunned with the size and variety of the load – and the pure generosity of Federated Folks. This was a divine intervention, heartwarming and unexpected! Socks, underwear, feminine hygiene products, soap, toothbrushes and toothpaste were all there and in quantities that could fill the needs of poor people for a long time and in expanded locations. We are truly blessed to be able to give with abandon!

With the approval of Lynne Kessell, we will partner occasionally with Phil Fogarty in the distribution of this bounty. Phil has been going to Cleveland's near east side every Tuesday evening with young men and women from local Catholic schools fulfilling their "community hours." (Phil is an alumnus of that school system.) They take lunch bags filled with nutritious food to the poorest of poor in low income housing, as well as to tent people who are well known to Phil. When my supplies are overflowing, like they are right now, I prepare bags of hygiene products for his homeless group and for St. Paul's. It is wonderful to be able to share the wealth with another church-based program. Please know that your generosity is abundantly utilized and appreciated by everyone at St. Paul's and the surrounding areas. On their behalf, THANK YOU SO MUCH!!
