While we are unable to gather together in the Sanctuary, Federated Church will offer two festive and inspirational online worship services on Christmas eve. We invite you to join us from the comfort of your own home. There will be two services, beginning at 4:00 pm and 6:00 pm. We are excited to be able to offer a half hour of pre-service music for those who would like to listen before the service begins. The **4:00 pm Family Service** will be led by Rev. Mark Simone and Kristin LeFeber, and feature the and RISE to Shine Band and singers from Children's Choir. Pre-service music will begin at 3:30 pm.

The **6:00 pm Traditional Service** we will feature the Chancel Choir, and Rev. Hamilton Throckmorton will preach. Pre-service music will begin at 5:30 pm.

Once the premieres end, these worship services will remain on our YouTube channel. You can view the Christmas Eve services later in the evening, on Christmas morning, or <u>any time!</u> (If you watch the playback, it will include the pre-service music, but you can jump ahead to the worship portion if you desire.) We wish you and your family a Merry Christmas this joyous season.

2020 Christmas Eve Offering

Even a pandemic cannot stop the celebrations for the birth of our savior, Jesus Christ. The pandemic has, however, caused great loss, hardships and financial strains on the world around us. In September the Mission and Service Commission announced that our Christmas Eve Offering will focus on our current mission partners who, like many, are working hard to lift up the needs of a growing number of people adversely affected by COVID-19.

Our four partners, St. Paul's Community Church (our Sister Church on the near west side), Chagrin Falls Park Community Center, Family Promise of Greater Cleveland and JustHope (in Nicaragua) have all submitted an outline of how the Christmas Eve Offering will help them immediately and in the future, realizing that the effects of this COVID-19 crisis will be with us long

after the virus fades away. Areas of consideration needed to focus on meeting each partner community's food, health, and/or housing needs. They could also include proposals that support people's work needs, such as transportation costs or work supplies. We can ease these difficult situations by giving generously to this year's Christmas Eve offering.

Please join the Mission and Service Commission and prayerfully consider the impact your gift will make for our beloved mission partners. The following is a brief summary of how our partners will use the funds they receive. To say they are grateful for our generous support is an understatement!

St. Paul's Community Church

shares that since the onset of COVID-19, St. Paul's has been open every Sunday Morning to serve coffee and a light meal to 10-25 people. Folks freshen up and use the restrooms, get a change of clothes from the thrift shop and receive sanitizer and other needed items.

Impact of our gifts:

- Thrift Shop (a place where many can go to procure items for themselves and their children) will get an organizational overhaul: new mobile shelving, holding shelves, and new permanent shelving in the shop. These improvements will help St. Paul's sort items more efficiently, having more items on display which will allow them to respond to emergency needs much faster.
- 2. Kitchen (addressing the community's food insecurities) will receive new appliances to replace unreliable pieces. While the kitchen is not currently in high demand because of COVID-19 restrictions, getting the kitchen ready now for the eventual increased demand is vital, as the reality of hardships will be a reality for some time to come.

Chagrin Falls Park Community Center

is a trusted institution for the residents, where people (children through seniors) have access to services daily. Since the start of COVID-19 shutdowns the demand on the Center's services has been on the rise and their funding and income streams have been reduced. The Center is closed to the public, and services such as wellness checks, Meals on Wheels deliveries, pantry food and cleaning supplies to seniors are being done remotely.

Impact of our gifts:

- 1. Purchase food and cleaning supplies for their pantry to fill a growing need in the community.
- 2. Maintaining the Center's vans which are now in constant use to handle deliveries.
- 3. Maintain staff levels to meet the community's demands on the Center.

Family Promise of Greater Cleveland

provides families facing crisis of homelessness with a safe place designed to engage, inspire, and guide them toward a future where they feel empowered to control the course of their lives. Throughout the COVID-19 crisis the work has not stopped, working to ensure all clients and staff are safe, while providing temporary housing to residents for an average of 12-14 weeks. Clients receive help with basic needs that support their efforts to prepare for, obtain and retain employment.

Impact of our gifts:

- 1. Transportation Assistance: RTA Bus Passes to get to and from work and gas cards for families with cars.
- 2. Help provide proper clothing for jobs, often the needs include uniforms and proper footwear.

JustHope

is a global partner with Federated Church. JustHope makes meaningful and significant impact in Chacraseca and LaFlor – two communities in Nicaragua - empowering community leaders, funding and constructing potable water systems, supporting and supplying health clinics in both communities, and so much more. The COVID-19 pandemic has put a strain on the operations and supplies of the clinics in both Chacraseca and LaFlor.

Impact of our gifts:

- 1. The ability to continue providing medications and dental supplies, as well as providing electricity and PPE for the Chacraseca Clinic.
- 2. Funding the Medical Support Program in LaFlor, (providing funds for residents to be able to take a bus to the city, fill prescriptions, and seek special medical services as needed).

Hamilton's Desk

Dear Friends,

No surprise to anyone, we are living in a time of heightened tension and suffering. Not only have over a quarter million people died in this country alone from COVID-19, but countless other diseases and accidents ravage us. And not only are people dying at an alarming rate, but many of us live with anxiety and frustration and loneliness lurking just beneath the surface. Tension and impatience and weariness are signs of the times. Ordinarily, we might be able to distance ourselves from the scope of the suffering, but this year in particular, it comes over us in wayes.

This is an Advent and Christmas like no other in our lifetimes. It will likely have a different shape, a different feel, from what we wish it had. Separated, as we are, from so many people we hold dear, forced, by a rampant disease, into habits and practices we wouldn't choose, we may feel as though all we can do is grit our teeth and endure it.

And maybe that is part of what we do. We lean into the headwind, the hurricane, the tornado that is 2020, and we acknowledge that sometimes life just doesn't go anywhere near the way we'd like it to go. It's thrown way off course by circumstances we simply can't control. Various challenges undo us. A pandemic takes a legion of lives. And we gut it out through a time in life that sometimes feels cold and distant and foreign.

And it's precisely into that world that God comes. It's precisely into that pain and emptiness and isolation that Christ is born. Life for Mary and Joseph was a trial. And Jesus came. Life for first-century Jews was filled with oppression and persecution. And Jesus came.

We, too, are blessed with a holy birth. We may sit in our own dingy stables. We may feel as endangered as Mary and Joseph fleeing the wrath of Herod. And it's precisely there that Jesus arrives. Jesus comes to walk with us on our journeys. Jesus comes to soothe us in our pain. Jesus comes to remind us of our own agency in making a difference in the world.

When Jesus is born, an angel comes to terrified shepherds and says, "Do not be afraid; for see—I am bringing you good news of great joy for all

the people: to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is the Messiah, the Lord" (Luke 2:10-11). Which is why, no matter what cards life deals us, we are able to praise God: "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those with whom God is pleased" (Luke 2:14). Thanks be to God!

Donor Advised Funds

Have you been confused by hearing the term "Intention to Give" from church staff or the Stewardship Committee and wondered what that means? As much as we can, we're trying to use **Intention to Give** rather than **Pledge** nowadays. This is because more and more of our members are supporting Federated Church by recommending grants from their **Donor-Advised Fund** (DAF) at a charitable sponsor.



These charitable sponsors (like Fidelity Charitable or American Endowment Foundation) are an independent public charity that sponsors a DAF program. Donors contribute to their donor-advised fund held by the charitable sponsor and receive an immediate tax benefit - in other words, they make irrevocable charitable contributions to these sponsors - and then have the privilege of recommending grants from their DAF to qualified public charities like Federated Church.

A grant to Federated from these DAFs can be used to fulfill a pledge because pledges to Federated Church represent intentions to give rather than a legally binding obligation. **However**, to prevent our members and their DAF's charitable sponsor from having to go through extra steps to prove this eligibility, we have started using this new phrase, one that was recommended by those same charitable sponsors.

It's easier on our members and is the best way to ensure that their grant recommendations are processed, with checks mailed to the church, in a timely manner - and we say AMEN to that!

Rejoice & Renew Capital Campaign Project Update

So many good "next steps" came from a recent Capital Campaign Projects Committee meeting thanks to the hard work of Becky Gruss, Keith Mast, Melissa Owen, Janis Stefanchik, and Laura Taylor. It's an exciting time for the Rejoice & Renew Capital Campaign as folks are continuing to fulfill their capital campaign pledges. With those funds in hand, our projects are continuing:

- The Rebranding Sub-committee of the Telling Our Story Commission, led by Diana Weber Gardner, has been working with consulting firm OrgStory to develop and execute a new brand to position Federated for its second century. As the interviews, focus sessions, and survey came to a close in October, they reviewed the findings in a presentation with OrgStory and this month are working on Brand strategy and Identity development.
- Senior Director of People & Operations Melissa Owen continued her work implementing our livestreaming equipment needs by improving lighting for the Chancel area of the Sanctuary. At the same time, she'll have new window blinds or shades installed for the Sanctuary that will also affect the lighting and will be a blessed relief to those sitting in the pews once we're holding in-person services again! This is an important campaign project as it was a funded Giving Opportunity a couple associated their pledge to the campaign with this particular project.
- In addition to the church's A/V needs, Melissa will be working with the administration staff, the operations staff, and custodial crew to:
 - Replace the bathroom fixtures. Five hands-free faucets are being installed each month and hands-free dryers will come next.
 - Upgrade the church's computer server before its shelf-life has expired!
 - Begin transitioning the outdoor lights to energy-efficient LED fixtures.
- Melissa will work with a vendor to update the carpeting on the first-floor hallway and a good portion of the main stairwell, complementing our new carpet in the Lobby and Sanctuary.

We are truly blessed! Thanks be to God.

Fund Development Office Update

New Generosity and Giving Webpage

This fall our church staff has been working (from home!) to create a new online resource for our Federated faith family to use when supporting the church. To do that, we've reworked the entire Generosity and Giving webpage on the church's website (fedchurch.org), so folks can make informed decisions about their gifts to Federated.

The first step was to place a "Giving" tab on the church's homepage. Thus, folks can type in <u>fedchurch.org/giving</u> when they want to go directly to this Generosity and Giving webpage.

There are four ways to give an immediate gift to Federated. Those ways are listed up top if folks are viewing this webpage from their mobile phones or on the right side if on a tablet or laptop/desktop.

We then thought about the various giving vehicles that our members and friends use to express their spiritual practice of supporting the church. That variety is reflected in the five sections listed on the webpage:

GIVE NOW
DONATING ITEMS (for our mission and ministry partners)
STOCK DONATIONS and
PLANNED GIVING TO THE LEGACY FUND

Each section currently provides descriptions, links, or forms that members, friends, and visitors may need to follow through with their intentions. And throughout this next year, additional information will be added to these sections - and more sections may be added if that meets your needs. So, give it a whirl! Stewardship Update

This year has certainly been full of many firsts! But one thing that became very apparent to us during these times is that social distancing does not mean spiritual distancing to our church! We have seen, time and time again, how engaged our congregation has become in their efforts to make a difference. With that in mind, we used this opportunity to transition toward year-round opportunities that lift the spiritual practices and scriptural basis for living generously. In order to begin this process, we worked on the following:

- Overhauled the Generosity and Giving webpage on the church's website for easier access to information needed when giving to the church (see article on page 5)
- Established online processes to state an intention to give or pledge via either the church website or the church's Realm community
- Added Generosity Impact Moments to the Sunday service every week to highlight the impact that we are collectively making. (see article on page 7)
- Mailed generosity and giving materials as well as the November Spire newsletter to 630 Federated members and friends
- Intentionally reworded the language on our generosity and giving materials, as much as possible, to accommodate those who give to the church through a Donor-Advised Fund (see article on page 4)
- Informed the congregation about the various ways that Federated is the Charity of Choice for our members, friends, and those in our community.

All of this was done because generosity is a privilege that EVERYONE deserves at any time. During this time, when we are working together to make a difference, can you imagine exceeding last year's percentage and dream of Federated achieving 70% participation in our Invitation to Generosity? or 75%?

We are pleased to say that BECAUSE OF YOU, we have started off strong. After only a week following Commitment Sunday, already 50 church members and friends have embraced this invitation of gratitude and generosity. Parish Nurse Corner

An update from Federated's Parish Nurse

Yesterday felt like a typical morning at St. Paul's, with the clinic having the same busy traffic that we used to have pre-COVID (except, of course, we were all wearing masks!) Many of our old-timers were back, signing up for boots/socks (from Avon UCC), picking up a pack of thermal underwear, some hygiene products, mittens and gloves. But then one of my favorite weekly clients, Charlie, came in needing comfort.

Our conversation began: "Hi Charlie, how have you been?" Surprisingly for him, he shook his head back and forth in an unhappy response. "Oh, oh. Did something bad happen?" Quietly he answered, "My Uncle died suddenly last week." "Was it from COVID?" I asked. Now whispering, "No it was cancer. But I didn't know he was so sick. He took care of me when I was little, and he was always fun to be with. I can't believe he is gone... no one told me he was sick," he repeated. "But the funeral was nice. He was a vet so he had a military ceremony, and two officers came to pay their respects and offer sympathy to all of us. That meant a lot. I just can't believe he is gone." We sat quietly together for a while, while he was feeling his grief, occasionally apologizing. At that, I said "I am glad you told me about your uncle's death... But I am sorry about how it makes you feel. Sometimes it helps to just share your feelings."

This is the essence of our Parish Nurse mission at St. Paul's: to offer friendship, a safe place to come to for supplies, and to experience friendship and support through trust. I am beginning my 6th year at the clinic and am always strengthened by my experiences.

Join Mark in studying the Book of James

This winter, Rev. Mark Simone is offering a Zoom Bible Study on the Book of James, which is one of his favorite books in the Bible. He answers: "To me, the Book of James has an Old Testament feel to it, similar to the book of Proverbs, but adding the New Testament sense of the resurrected Christ. James argues for practical action in our faith life. The book has a feel like what is called the Wisdom Literature in the Old Testament. God's people are encouraged to act like God's people. James offers few latitudes for those who do not measure up. James believed that we Christians show indication of faith by walking the walk and avoiding the bright and shiny distractions. For James, a faith that does not produce change is a faith that is worthless (James 2:17)."
