Dear Friends,

Throughout this Lenten season, we have been listening more closely for God in our worship services, embracing considerable time for prayer. Some have participated in a compelling study of *The Last Week*, a book by progressive theologians Marcus Borg and John Dominic Crossan that challenges many of our traditional ideas about the death of Jesus.

Soon we will enter Holy Week, the time when we gather to remember the last days of Jesus' life. Many people choose to skip over our worship service on Maundy Thursday. Coming to church on a weeknight isn't part of their practice. Other commitments may interfere. We all know the story, so there is no real need to attend.

And yet, when we skip from the triumphal entry of Jesus into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday to the resurrection joy of Easter, we miss participating in the story that is at the center of our faith. We miss the collective effervescence of which French sociologist Emile Durkheim speaks, the intense emotion and sense of unity that arises when we gather in our faith community to participate in the ritual of recalling the last supper.

It is easy to rush through Holy Week and arrive on Easter morning to celebrate resurrection joy. But that moment will be so much richer, so much more meaningful if we gather along the way to recall all of the events of the week we call holy.

Maundy Thursday recalls so much about Jesus' life and ministry: his deep commitment to serving others, his love of gathering with friends around the table, his willingness to challenge the oppression and dominance of those in power and to instead lift up the alternative message of God's realm.

As we recall the events of Jesus' last days, we will gather to embody and celebrate the things that Jesus valued and taught. We'll gather at the table and in worship. We will spend some special time in prayer. And we will be filled with collective effervescence that will bond us closer as a community. I pray that you will make time to be a part of these important times of recollection and commitment. I promise that if you do, your resurrection joy will be so much deeper, so much more meaningful.

Holy Week Services

As we seek to immerse ourselves more fully into Holy Week, we will try out new aspects to familiar services and add in some new ways to experience the depth of the story that is at the center of our faith.

April 17: Maundy Thursday

Just as Jesus did when he gathered for supper with his disciples, we will begin our evening at **6:30 pm in Fellowship Hall** sharing food and wisdom learned as we have listened more closely for God in this season.

As our Lenten journey draws to a close, we will focus this night on Jesus' dark journey in his final days. After our meal together, we will move to the sanctuary to appreciate pre-service music from 7:30 – 8. Worship begins at 8 pm as six dramatists share their powerful stories that offer different perspectives on the events that led to the crucifixion of Jesus. Don't miss this powerful recitation of the Passion story.

For those worshipping online: please gather your communion elements. Please consider turning down your lights as the service progresses to experience the full impact of the worship experience.

April 19: Holy Saturday

On this holiest of days, when the disciples knew that Jesus had been killed, but had not yet experienced the joy of resurrection, you are invited to spend some time at our eight-hour Prayer Vigil in quiet meditation reflecting on Jesus' life and death. Take time in the chapel to consider the powerful events of Holy Week and how they shape your faith and life, or reflect on compelling artwork using visio divina as you follow the prayer stations throughout the building. **The prayer vigil will take place from 9 am – 5 pm. Please consider taking 30 minutes of your day to spend at this powerful vigil. Your Easter experience will be far richer for having made the commitment. April 20: Easter Sunday

Our Lenten journey concludes with overflowing joy as we celebrate the message of the resurrection with pageantry and rousing music! Recalling Jesus' question of Mary in the tomb, we will consider who – or what – we are looking forward to on Easter morning? In what ways will we continue to look for Jesus in the world?

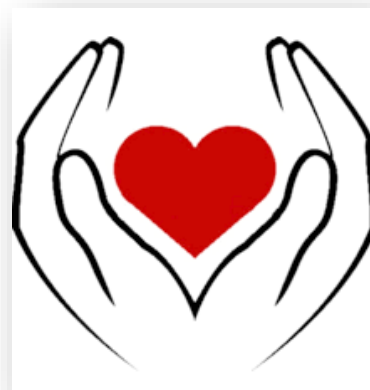

Lenten Challenge: Recommit 40 Days to Creation Care as a Spiritual Practice

What does Creation Care have to do with Lent?

We are in the middle of the 40 days of Lent, a time of deep reflection and of shifting from living on autopilot to practicing mindfulness in ways that deepen our connection to God.

Committing to creation care can be a form of spiritual practice. Does your faith journey include thinking about leaving a healthy and safe world for future generations? What we do now, affects the future of the planet.



This year, Easter falls close to Earth Day, an international day to recommit to care for the earth. Dedicating these 40 days to actively stewarding the fragility of nature will restore an intentional commitment to future generations, to endangered species, and to our call to ensure the health and unity of the planet and all living beings. **What might you do during the 40 days of lent to begin or enhance your spiritual practices to move us towards "right relationship" with the Earth and All God's people and creatures?**

Members are already naming their commitments

"Leaves" on the *Creation Care Commitment Tree* in the front foyer show that couples, individuals, and families mindfully commit the 40 days of Lent to:

- *Start composting food scraps*
- *Buy only what I need*
- *Repurpose glass and cardboard containers to give them another life*
- *Remember to bring reusable bags for groceries*
- *Swear off plastic*
- *Reuse recyclable things*
- *Write to congress for environmental protections*

Share It Forward!

Prayerfully reflect on your current habits and practices and consider ways to change, add or interrupt routines that may be harmful to God's creation. *What habits, practices and ways of living can we begin or expand that will help the earth thrive?* THEN share what YOU are committing to, your challenges, and your solutions. Encourage at least one other member to adopt a new practice and to be your support buddy.



Throughout Lent, come to the **Creation Care Commitment Tree** in the lower lobby. Each member, family, or group is invited to add a leaf. Take a paper "leaf", write your name or the name of your group/family on one side, and describe one or more habits or practices that you will commit to for the 40 days on the other side. As we add the "leaves" to the tree, we are naming the specific commitments we are making to support and care for God's Creation. **Who will you invite to participate?** Let's fill the tree with a collective spiritual recommitment & practice in our faith journey!

Creation Care Tip of the Month for APRIL

One simple step toward living more sustainably is to adopt a few easy DIY recipes for products you use regularly. Whether for home & garden or health & beauty, finding homemade alternatives for products you would otherwise purchase is worthwhile. It helps reduce single use plastics, minimizes environmental and animal harm, and sometimes even costs less. Here are a few examples that are on this writer's go-to list.

All-purpose cleaner:

4 cups water (use distilled water if solution will be stored)
1 cup vodka (inexpensive grocery store kind in a recyclable glass bottle is good)
1+ generous tsp. mild liquid castile soap (such as Dr. Bronner's) or clear dye free dish liquid
Essential oil for fragrance, as desired (10-20 drops or so; citrus oil such as lemon, orange or grapefruit are uplifting while cleaning!)
Mix well in pitcher and pour into clean repurposed spray bottles for general cleaning, or mix in a bucket and use to clean floors (okay for hardwood floors too.)

Air Freshener:

1/2 cup distilled water
1/8 cup vodka (inexpensive grocery store kind in a recyclable glass bottle is good)
1 drop natural dish liquid (to emulsify)
Essential oil for fragrance, as desired (6-10 drops or so; clove oil is excellent for this purpose)
Mix well and pour into small, clean, repurposed spray bottle. Great for bathrooms and cat litter areas.

Natural Deodorant:

2 tablespoons baking soda
2 tablespoons arrowroot powder (more for thicker product)
3 tablespoons slightly warmed coconut oil (more for creamier product) Note: use refined oil unless you like the coconut scent of unrefined oil
Essential oil as desired (20 drops or so; lavender oil is particularly nice)
Combine dry ingredients thoroughly, then mix in both oils and blend until smooth and creamy. Store in small glass jars with lids. Use fingertips to apply thin layer to clean underarms.

Insecticidal soap (2% solution:)

2 cups filtered or distilled water
1 to 1.5 tsp. mild, unscented liquid castile soap or natural dish liquid
Mix well and pour into clean repurposed spray bottle. Shake well before using. Apply to plants twice a week to control harmful insects such as aphids, covering all areas including tops and bottoms of leaves, stems, and soil. Use late morning or early evening to avoid times of high pollinator activity, avoiding flowers; wet soap mixture kills insects including pollinators.

Rodent Deterrent Spray:

1 cup water
1/4 cup rubbing alcohol
1/2 tsp. clear, natural dish liquid
20 drops each of cinnamon and peppermint oil
Mix well and pour into clean repurposed spray bottle. Spray in cracks and crevices where mice may try to enter home or garage. (May also work to deter ants from kitchen countertops.)

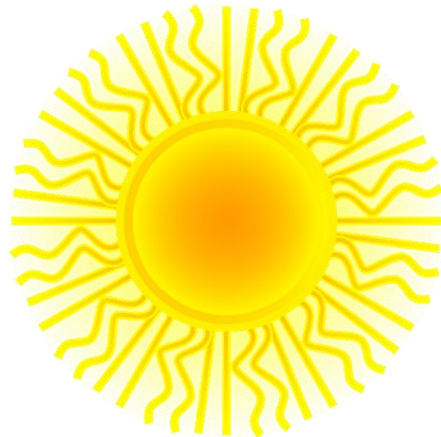

Household Recycling

*When you take your recycling in or have it picked up **do not include plastic bags.***

Be sure that all items for recycling are loose. Check online for details.

- **Cans** - Empty, rinse, remove lids – include only food and beverage cans and foil trays.
- **Glass** - Empty, rinse, remove lids– include only food and beverage bottles or jars.
- **Plastic** - Empty, rinse, replace cap – include only household bottles, jugs, jars that have a neck which is narrower than the body of the item.
- **Paper** - Newspapers, magazines, catalogs, office and computer paper, junk mail, telephone books, hard (cover removed) or soft cover books, envelopes, (hard, windowed), flattened cardboard packing boxes and lightweight cardboard boxes, rolls, tubes, cores, shredded paper—must be bagged.
 - **NO** gift-wrapping paper, paper towels, napkins, tissue paper
 - **NO** milk cartons, juice boxes, takeout food containers, oily pizza boxes, or packing material

WHEN IN DOUBT, THROW IT OUT!

****Plastic Bags – Do not put plastic bags into your trash/waste. You can bring your plastic bags (along with other similar plastic) for recycling to the bins at Giant Eagle, Heinen’s, Walmart, Target, Drug Mart****

- No STYROFOAM – look online for places that will take your Styrofoam.
- *NO milk cartons, juice boxes, takeout food containers, oily pizza boxes, packing materials and NO gift-wrapping paper, paper towels, napkins, tissue paper.*

Inviting shared solutions, we consider ways to work together for shared solutions to heal our land, water, relationships, and ourselves.

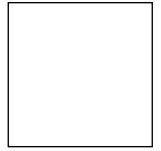
Here are some ways you can engage in environmental justice, too:
