Dear Friends,

Although you will read this about ten days after Easter, as I write this morning, we are at the beginning of Holy Week, one of the most challenging weeks for those of us who immerse ourselves in the life and way of Jesus. While I love Jesus' emotion and courage, these are difficult days, full of events that show us both the incredible joys of our faith, but also the reprehensible acts that humans will take when given the power.

On the day on which I write, it seems we have come to a crossroads moment unlike any other in this already-fraught presidency as it appears the administration is willing to ignore the decision of the Supreme Court, spinning our nation and its constitution into uncharted waters. That this comes at the beginning of Holy Week is not an irony lost on many people of faith. It reminds us that our call as those who proclaim to follow Jesus is to stand up and speak out when oppression seeks to silence vulnerable voices, when a domination system asserts its strength and power, when God's justice is being overrun.

When the domination system of the Roman Empire and the collaboration of the temple leaders sought to disregard human life, Jesus refused to sit by and watch. He spoke out, challenged authority and continued to offer the alternative view of God's love and justice. Even in his darkest hour, facing a torturous crucifixion, Jesus chose courage over silence and complicity.

The gift of our faith is that, following the dark days of Holy Week, comes resurrection. Death does not have the last word. Hope is reborn from the pain and struggle that feels like the end. So, too, today we can trust, even when we may feel uncertain and anxious about the state of our country, that there is reason to have hope. As people of the resurrection, we know that even from moments of great struggle will come renewed strength and commitment to justice if we but follow the teachings of Jesus and speak up when those around us are being oppressed and mistreated.

My prayer today is that we will choose to not simply show up at church on Easter Sunday bedecked in our finery to sing "Christ the Lord Is Risen Today," but will also take some of the risks that Jesus did to embody our faith and stand with those who are vulnerable. It is only when we commit to

doing so that we can bring the realm of God near and ensure that justice overcomes the human desire for power. May we all choose to live out these core tenants of our faith in the days and weeks ahead. Like Jesus, even in our darkest hours, may we choose courage over silence and complicity.

From the Desk of the Moderator...

Staffing Updates Jeff Miller, Moderator and Chair, Senior Pastor Search Committee

The Senior Pastor search committee completed the church's profile, which announces our open position, and it was posted on the UCC website at the end of March. We have begun to receive some applications for our Senior Pastor position already. We will take our time with this portion of the process, as we have with the overall search, to ensure we are carefully considering the needs of our congregation and listening for God's leadership.

During the recent listening sessions, along with qualities for a Senior Pastor, we also clearly heard a call for prioritizing leadership and programming for our youth and families. With the recommendation of Vicki's Transition Team and the HR Committee, the Church Council has approved a new full-time position of **Director of Youth and Family Ministries.** We have intentionally left this position open to both clergy and non-clergy candidates with the hope of keeping the net as wide as possible to make sure we get top candidates. The Church Council also discussed and decided that it is in our best interest to begin the search right away. Although we considered waiting until after the new Senior Pastor came on board, we didn't want to risk losing our current momentum or having a gap in youth programming at the beginning of the school year.

To make sure we can meet all our pastoral care needs, we are officially bringing Judy Bagley-Bonner back on staff. Judy has been assisting with pastoral care for the past several months but has been doing it somewhat behind the scenes. So, we have created the new position **Minister of Pastoral Support**. She will be able to offer pastoral care, officiate funerals, preach when needed, and help Vicki now and the new pastor when they arrive.

In early May, Kristin LeFeber will be stepping down from her role as **Director of Children's Spiritual Formation**. She recently graduated from Eden Theological Seminary with a master's degree in Spiritual Direction. Although we are sad to lose her on staff, we fully support this new chapter in her life and can't wait to watch what she will do next.

While change can be challenging, the Church Council is very excited about the direction our church is going in, and we are grateful for the strong participation of the congregation as we approach this transition.






Church Financial Update– 1st Quarter of 2025

On behalf of the Federated Finance & Properties Committee, I'd like to share an update on our financial position. Through the first three months of the year, we have collected \$344,769 in Pledge Receipts. That is 39% of the pledges that we budged to receive for the entirety of 2025. On average over the past ten years, through the first three months we have \$439,616 in pledge receipts making up 42% of the total budgeted for the year. The chart below shows how much we received in pledges on average over the past 10 years in blue, the pledges we received in 2024 in green and the pledges we received this year in red.



During most years, we receive a large percentage of our pledges in January. Pledge receipts decrease significantly in February and generally stay around that level until October, at which point pledges start in increase through the end of the year. The chart below shows how much we've received on average each month over the past 10 years in blue. The bars in green show how much we received each month in 2024. The bars in red show how much we received each month thus far in 2025.



The Finance & Properties Committee would also like to acknowledge that 2025 has been a year of volatility from a market perspective. Beyond the investments that Federated has through our Legacy Fund, we also invest a portion of our assets. Those assets are in our Operations Investment Account. For the first three months of the year, the Operations Investment Account decreased in value by 2.6%. For context, over the past twelve months, the Operations Investment Account increased in value by 3.6%. We will continue to invest our assets in a responsible manner that provides more than sufficient liquidity, while allowing our assets to grow over time.



These improvements will not only preserve the Family Life Center's use but will also allow us to continue providing a unique and welcoming space for the congregation, community and church fellowship activities.



Women's Friday Morning Bible Study


Are you interested in the Bible? Would you like to find out what it might say about:



Environmental Tip of the Month

Food Waste Harms the Environment

Wasting less food is one of the simplest and most effective actions we can take to reduce environmental harm.

Consider that:



- 40% of food in the U.S. goes uneaten, nearly all of which ends up in landfills Food waste makes up nearly 60% of landfill waste
- Landfills are the largest source of human-causes methane, a potent green house gas

Along with each pound of wasted food are the planetary costs of all the land, water, energy, and labor used in production, transportation, processing, and distribution

Reducing food waste saves money:

- The average family spends over \$3,000 on uneaten food
- Nationally, food waste represents a dollar cost of over \$160 billion



Food waste is also a social justice issue: food should feed people, not landfills.

Using food more responsibly requires intention, commitment, knowledge, and daily practice. Here are some good websites to help get you started:

Other than for infant formula, product dates indicate only peak quality, not safety! If food is properly handled and stored, and shows no signs of spoilage, most outdated food is likely still fine to eat.

Planting Native Contributes to the Wellbeing of All



In April, the CLC hosted **Sprout & Share: Cultivating Connections & Sustainable Gardening Practices**, a talk led by Michele Colopy. Attendees explored how native flower planting and policy updates can support greener cities, drawing inspiration from Michele's hands-on experience transforming urban spaces into pollinator havens. The presentation quickly became an intimate conversation with Colopy's guidance on the transformation being planned by attendees for their landscapes.

According to Colopy, a great question to ask yourself about what to plant is "Is it doing anything for anyone else?" This question invites reflection not only on how we care for our environment but also on how we contribute to the well-being of those around us. Our actions—whether in the garden or in advocacy—should serve a greater good.

The CLC is developing programming to increase the knowledge and skills necessary to transform our homes into nature-centered spaces. These small steps are critical as the CLC partners with organizations across Northeast Ohio to transform communities through programs such as *Tree Up Akron*, where we've provided hundreds of native plants and trees in Akron neighborhoods.
